WEEK'S NEWS HAPPENINGS OF LOWER SIUSLAW

CARVER RAILROAD AND ITS IMPORTANCE TO SIUSLAW COUNTY—REPAIRING OLD CANNERY—LOCAL AND PERSONAL ITEMS OF FLORENCE AND VICINITY.

Now interest has lately been aroused among the Eugene people in regard to the Carver railroad from Corvallis. At first it was given out that the road would run from Corvallis by the way of Blachley to Alsea. Several miles of the road are already completed, most of the grading is done near Monroe and the engineers are reported to have been looking out a route up to Smithfield and thence to Elmira. This makes it look as if the Siuslaw is the objective point which is a much better route for a railroad and will furnish more business than the other. Then, too, when the harbor here is improved, which is certain to be done in the near future, the trains would connect at Florence with boats for San Francisco. It is quite probable, too, that the line will be built to Eugene and connect with the main line of the Southern Pacific at that place.

Repairing Cannery A crew of men went to work last Monday to repair the old cannery at Rose Hill. The property was purchased by O. W. Hurd several years ago but has not been opened since he owned it. It is the intention to fit the building up again for canning salmon and operate it this year by the Siuslaw Co-operative Cannery Co. The retorts and other fixtures from the Hurd cannery will be used there. The schooner Oakland is expected here the first of the week with machinery and supplies, and it is expected to have the cannery ready to take fish by September 10th.

Married At the Umpqua Life Saving Station on Wednesday, August 26, 1908, Mr. Fred Hollister of North Bend, and Miss Mary Bergman of the life-saving station. The young couple left in the afternoon by the beach route for Coos Bay and will go to Seattle for a wedding trip.

At the residence of James Johnston at Deadwood, Ore., at noon on Wednesday, August 26, 1908, Mr. Frank L. Condon, of Minerva, and Miss Edna Mae Dean of Walterville, Rev. N. W. Phelps officiating. After the ceremony and congratulations, a fine dinner was served to the happy couple and their guests by Mrs. Johnston, and everything passed off pleasantly. Mr. and Mrs. Condon left in the afternoon on their way to Florence to spend a couple of weeks in this vicinity. The groom is a well known and highly respected young man of good habits and sterling worth, who has lived in this section the greater part of his life and is a successful teacher. The bride is a refined and intelligent young lady who has been teaching in the schools of the county.

Local and Personal Last Monday a letter was received from Prof. Wimberly stating that he and Mrs. Wimberly will not accept the positions to which they were elected in Florence public schools. The board have written to Miss Spire who taught the intermediate department last year, offering her the position of primary teacher and are in hopes that she will accept, but the position of principal is still vacant.

The steamer Robarts left Friday with the schooner Albion in tow for a trip to Astoria. They arrived there Saturday morning, having made the run up in about 4 hours. They are expected back in a day or so with supplies and a crew of Chinamen for Kyle & Sons' cannery. Efforts are being made to induce the government forestry department to take up the work of opening a road around Cape Perpetua and the people of Hecla are very strongly in hopes this will be done. It is estimated the work will cost about \$4,000.

This week Captain Beerman sold his tract of land lying northeast of Tiltcocks Lake to Mr. Lundy for \$1600. As he bought it less than two years ago for \$500 he made a nice profit on his investment.

AMUSEMENTS

To say that a man's singing voice ripens with years seems rather an absurd statement, but it is the truth when said in connection with Richard Jose, "the world's greatest contralto," who comes to the Eugene theatre September 3, as the words of a California critic impart: "To have heard Jose sing last night was like turning the leaves of some long unopened volume, and there coming upon a familiar face or a pleasing passage that had lingered half hidden in the memory—so like his old self was Jose and so like their old sweet tones and notes of those tender ballads pouring in limpid clearness from the singer's perfectly controlled throat. "Silver Threads Among the Gold," "When You and I Were Young, Maggie," those old familiar melodies that carried one back to childhood and half-hearted youth he sang, with a voice that is evidently a gift—not the creation of highly paid instructors—nor yet lacking the polish and finish usually considered as only obtainable from this source. As a matter of fact Jose upsets a good many traditions of the singer; he is democratic to a degree; his repertoire is a popular one, and he affects none of the swagger which some concert singers attach to their positions. Those who heard Jose in the old days applauded and applauded him last night, and not alone because of the pleasing sentiment of recollection, but because they found that Jose's voice had ripened and mellowed and grown sweeter with age, like some old wine that is only opened on state occasions. Playgoers already know Jose, and before he uttered a note there was a salvo of applause. But when he began to sing with the smooth, flowing tones of "Silver Threads Among the Gold" and "The River of Life," there was reason for the encores which followed and for the encores that followed the encores. Apparently the audience would have been willing to have remained in their seats the balance of the night, just to hear Jose sing.

At the Grand Mr. Burns has secured the services of Miss Hendershott to sing the illustrated songs again, and no doubt she will meet with a warm welcome from the many friends she made while singing at the Grand in the early part of the summer.
