Sometimes a clock does not run—sometimes a store's ads does not run. A "run-down" clock or ad are about equally unsatisfactory, unserviceable, misleading. Curious thing about it is that a merchant who would think it absurd to have a run-down or out-of-repair clock will, sometimes, deliberately let his ad stop running. It is not wise, nor good business, nor defensible on any known grounds—but it is sometimes done.
