BOY STEALS \$25 FROM LADY'S PURSE

HELMED HER HOME WITH BAGGAGE FROM DEPOT AND TAKES COIN—ADMITS HIS GUILT.

Mrs. Simons, who resides on East Third street, near High, arrived home from a trip north on yesterday afternoon's train. While at the depot she laid her purse down on a bench for a moment and when she reached her residence she missed \$25 that had been in the purse. She thought that someone in the depot had taken the money while she was transacting business with the ticket agent, and told Chief of Police Farrington of the occurrence. She told him that a boy had helped her carry her baggage from the depot and entered her house with her, so the chief at once suspected that the boy was the guilty party instead of someone at the depot. He went to the boy's home and questioned him, succeeding in obtaining a confession that he had taken \$5 from the purse as it lay on a table in Mrs. Simons' house. He had spent \$1.50 of the amount and gave the remainder to the chief of police. The chief pressed him fur-

ther and finally the boy admitted that he had taken all the money and went out in the back yard and produced the coin from a hiding place. The boy's name is not given through respect for his parents.

SHRINERS WILL COME TO EUGENE IN SPECIAL TRAIN

The sun has been busy for the past week or more heating up the sands about Eugene for the benefit of the barefooted novices who next Saturday will wend their painful way across them to enter the sacred portals of Shrinersdom, says the Portland Journal. There are expected to be a considerable number of visiting Shriners from the East present in Eugene. The special train from Portland will consist of five coaches and a baggage car, and will be for the exclusive use of the Shriners.
