# CAREY ACT LAND SALE

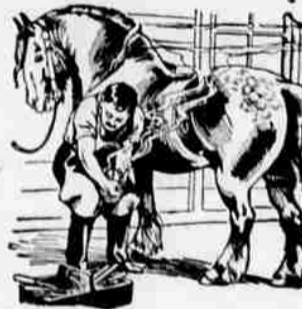

## AUGUST WAS GOOD MONTH FOR BUILDING

PERMITS GRANTED BY INSPECTOR McFARLAND AGGREGATED OVER \$56,000—NEARLY \$290,000 PUT INTO BUILDINGS IN EUGENE SINCE OFFICE OF INSPECTOR WAS ESTABLISHED FIRST OF APRIL.

During the month of August Building Inspector V. McFarland issued 45 building permits, the cost of building aggregating \$56,352. This is an average month. For the past five months, or since the office of inspector was created, the cost of building for which permits have been granted amounts to nearly \$290,000. In April it aggregated \$83,800, in May, \$24,945; June, over \$70,000, and July, \$47,675. Had the office of inspector been in existence in March, the report for that month would have been much greater than for any of the months since. During that month the new Presbyterian church building, the stone Bible University building, the Coleman block and numerous residences were begun. No permits have as yet been issued for the new two-story brick to be built by the Hovey heirs at the corner of West Eighth and Olive streets, or for the three-story brick to be erected on West Eighth street between Olive and Charnelton. They will swell the figures for September to a good total.

## BUSY DAY FOR CIVIL WAR VETERANS

Toledo, Sept. 3.—The continuous round of receptions, reunions, excursions, parades and other features of entertainment that the veterans of the Grand Army and their friends have enjoyed since the first of the week gave way this morning to a season of work. Promptly at 10 o'clock the business session of the forty-second annual encampment opened in the Valentine theatre. The auditorium had been elaborately decorated for the occasion by the ladies of Toledo.

Commander-in-chief Burton called the gathering to order and delivered his annual address. The session was devoted to the annual reports of the several officers and standing committees, including those of Adjutant-General Jere T. Dow, Senior Vice-Commander L. E. Griffith, Inspector-General C. D. R. Stowits, and Judge Advocate General L. W. Collins. New officers for the year, including a commander-in-chief, will be chosen at the concluding session of the encampment tomorrow.

The Women's Relief Corps, Ladies of the G. A. R., Daughters of Veterans and other auxiliary bodies held business sessions today at which reports for the year were presented and discussed.  
Four campfires are scheduled for various parts of the city tonight, including a monster campfire of Commander-in-chief Burton at the Valentine theatre, at which several of the past commanders-in-chief are to speak.
