### EUGENE MAY HAVE A MILK CONDENSERY

C. E. ROGERS, REPRESENTING DETROIT CAPITAL, HERE INVESTIGATING—IF ENOUGH COWS ARE FOUND PLANT WILL BE BUILT AT ONCE

C. E. Rogers, a friend of I. H. Bingham, from Detroit, Mich., is in Eugene looking over the country in the interest of capitalists who desire to put in a milk condensing plant here.

If cows in sufficient number to justify the erection of a medium-sized plant can be guaranteed within a radius of eight miles, the plant will be erected at once. No bonus will be asked from the citizens, as the people who are contemplating putting in the plant have plenty of capital with which to carry out their plans.

Mr. Bingham will show Mr. Rogers the country surrounding Eugene this afternoon, and a meeting of the board of governors of the Commercial Club will be held this evening for the purpose of making arrangements to prepare the required data.

Milk condensing plants in other parts of the state have paid from the start, and there is no reason why such a plant here should not. There appears to be enough cows in the vicinity of Eugene to furnish enough milk for the operation of the plant, and it is confidently expected that Mr. Rogers will carry a favorable report to the people whom he represents.

### NATRON ROAD WILL BE BUILT SAYS HARRIMAN

"All work originally outlined for Oregon, which was checked or discontinued last fall on account of the financial depression, will be carried to completion at once. The Central Oregon line will be built as quickly as the materials and money can be gotten together. That branch is now out of my hands and in charge of the local traffic managers. It will be started immediately.

"The Oregon and Washington road, which includes the peninsula tunnel, the Tillamook extension, the Klamath-Natron line, the removal of the tracks on Fourth street in Portland, in fact all the work projected when we were compelled to withdraw from the field last fall, will be finished without loss of time.

"With the exception of the Central Oregon road, these other projects will take more time and it will be some months before we can get started on them, but all will be carried to completion. It is not our intention to abandon any of the projected work in Oregon.—E. H. Harriman in Portland interview.

### PEACE BETWEEN RAILROAD MAGNATES

Friendly rivalry for traffic, instead of war to the knife as heretofore, will govern the relations between the Hill and Harriman systems hereafter, according to a statement made by E. H. Harriman at a reception given him at the Commercial Club last night. The former misunderstanding, he says, are over, and a friendly basis of operations has been reached.

All Oregon lines projected by the Harriman system will be built, said he, just as soon as practicable. After a year of financial unrest Mr. Harriman says the interests he represents have escaped with hardly a scratch and are in good shape to proceed with construction.

Mr. Harriman left Portland Saturday night by special train for San Francisco. He stopped at Medford and Ashland, and will join his family at Weed, Cal., yesterday.
