

## MINNESOTA SETTLERS DIE FOR THEIR LIVES

### Jones Is Leading

Seattle, Sept. 9.—Late returns from 22 out of 39 counties indicate that Jones defeated Ankeny for United States senator.

The Democratic vote is light in the absence of any serious contests and no figures on the result are obtainable.

## IMPORTANT LABOR CASE IN COURT AROUSSES INTEREST

Washington, Sept. 9.—There is widespread interest in the Buck Stove & Range case, in which the company is seeking to have the American Federation of Labor, President Gompers, John Mitchell and other labor leaders punished for contempt of court, and although the case has not been tried, it is not certain that the case will be tried now or postponed until the October term. Interest is added to the case by reason of the fact that the chief of counsel for the Federation is Judge Alton B. Parker, former Democratic candidate for president. Besides Judge Parker there is present a notable array of counsel.

The injunction which the labor leaders are accused of violating is one which was issued last year, prohibiting the Federation (the Federation's official publication) from advising organized labor that the Buck company is "unfair" to its employees, or from otherwise advising organized labor of this alleged fact.

The answer of Messrs. Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison to the contempt proceedings was filed this morning. In it they asked that the issues be tried by jury, and not by Justice Gould alone. For the most part Mr. Gompers admits the correctness of the assertions from his speeches, interviews and editorials, but he declares that none of them was intended to be in contempt of any decree of the court.

The principal charge made in the petition refers to criticisms of the injunction made by Mr. Gompers in an editorial, in which he characterized the injunction as an invasion of the liberty of the press and of the right of free speech, and further said it would be impossible to comply with all its terms. Regarding this charge Mr. Gompers, Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Morrison replied as follows:

"Answering the 17th paragraph of the petition the respondent says that the editorial therein referred to is only to be understood properly and in its entirety, and he accordingly for the full contents thereof refers to the files of this court. He denies that said editorial constituted in any respect the contempt of court, or that it was in any degree disrespectful of the action of the court. On the contrary, he says it contained such fair and temperate criticisms as he had

## LOS ANGELES OFFICER VICTIM OF BURGLARS

CAPTAIN AMBLE OF CITY FORCE RECEIVES THREE BULLETS FROM DESPERADO, WHO ESCAPES—COMPANION LANDED IN JAIL BY CAPTAIN FLAMMER—FUTILE ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE

Los Angeles, Sept. 9.—In a desperate shooting affray with two burglars at Ninth street and Grand avenue, at about 10 o'clock this morning, Captain Walter Aubie, of the city force, was shot three times and probably fatally injured. Captain Flammer, who was with Aubie, escaped unharmed. One of the men, Fred Horning, a chauffeur, was captured and taken to the police station, but the man who did the shooting escaped, his name being given as Carl Sutherland, formerly a waiter at the University Club.

Flammer and Aubie had previously surprised Horning and Sutherland in their rooms. The officers started with their captives to take the car at Ninth street and Grand avenue. While waiting for a car Sutherland suddenly whipped out a large revolver and fired three times at Aubie. Sutherland then fled and Horning also attempted to get away, but Flammer captured him and succeeded in landing him at the station.

## PORTLAND CAPITALISTS MAY INVEST IN EUGENE

## STEAMER LEHUA LOST WITH CARGO

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—The steamer Lehua arrived today with salmon from Bristol Bay, Alaska, and reports the total loss of the American ship Lucille on August 15, when she parted her moorings at Nushagak and went ashore. Her cargo of 25,000 cases of salmon and 1200 barrels of salt salmon was lost. On board were 164 men, all of whom escaped.

## KERN WILL SPEAK IN EUGENE, SEPT. 22

Portland, Sept. 7.—John W. Kern, the Democratic candidate for the presidency, expects to make three addresses in Oregon. The Democratic state central committee expects Kern to arrive in Eugene by time to speak at the district fair at Pendleton, September 20, and deliver an address at Portland, October 1. Definite arrangements have been received by Congressman Thayer, Dem. of Clatsop, that he will deliver three addresses to the voters of Oregon. He will speak at Medford September 21, Eugene on the evening of September 22 and at Astoria the night of September 23. Possibly he may speak at Ashland.

## WRIGHT'S NEW WORLD RECORD FOR AEROPLANES

Washington, Sept. 9.—A new world's record for aeroplane flights was established at Fort Meyer, Va., early today, when Orville Wright closed the parade grounds 58 times and remained in the air 57 minutes and 21 seconds. Today he attained

A height of 120 feet and traveled under perfect control, his speed was 100 miles an hour. The previous world record was established last Monday in France, when Louis de la Genne remained in the air 29 minutes and 24 seconds.

## NELSON BESTS GANS IN HARD FOUGHT BATTLE

Nelson wins in the twenty-first round.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—A big crowd witnessed the Nelson-Gans battle for the world's championship today, the betting odds favoring the Dane. Both men were in the ring promptly and looked in the pink of condition.

Round 1.—Nelson rushed to centre going right after Gans. Gans met him with right uppercut to jaw, and followed it with two similar blows as they broke from a clinch. Nelson forced Gans back, putting right left to body. Gans shot right and left to jaw. Nelson drove hard right to Gans' face, Gans retreating with a right chop to Nelson's jaw. Gans then rocked Nelson's head as round ended. Gans' round.

Round 2.—Nelson forced Gans around ring; Gans countered with right to body and two rights to jaw. Nelson forced Gans to ropes and then drove him to centre of ring, landing right and left on Gans' stomach. Nelson's round.

Round 3.—Gans shot right and left to Dane's jaw and tried to force him to fight at long range. Nelson reached Gans' body with right and left. Nelson's round.

Round 4.—Nelson rushed in last Gans drove him back with right and left to jaw, forcing the batter to close quarters. Nelson forced Gans against ropes and landed hard left to stomach and right swing to the face. Close fighting and round comparatively even.

Round 5.—Gans landed hard right to body and rocked Nelson's head three times in quick succession with right and left upper cuts, but the Dane merely waded in for more. Gans' uppercut twice with right to jaw, shaking Nelson up, and staggered him with right to jaw as going round. Gans' round.

Round 6.—Nelson played for stomach and then hooked a left and right to the jaw, forcing Gans to clinch. Gans put two rights to body, restoring right and left swings to face. Gans caught Nelson on the face with
