MANY KILLED ON BRIDGE WORK AT NEW YORK

FIFTY-FIVE MEN LOSE LIVES ON NEW BLACKWELL'S ISLAND STRUCTURE, ACCORDING TO FEDERATION OF LABOR REPORT—DUE TO EMPLOYMENT OF NON-UNION MEN

New York, Sept. 11.—Fifty-five men have been killed in the building of the new Blackwell's Island bridge across the East river, according to the report of a committee of the Central Federation of Labor, appointed to ascertain the fatalities on that work. Fifteen workmen suffered death in the Chelsea dock improvement.

BIG MAPLE TREES WILL REMAIN

GIANTS AT HOFFMAN HOUSE CORNER WILL NOT BE CUT DOWN AT PRESENT

Yesterday afternoon Henry Hoffman, owner of the Hoffman House property at the corner of Ninth and Willamette streets, put a man to work cutting down the three big maple trees that have long stood on the Ninth street side of the hotel and which have furnished shade for the building for years. During the evening a petition asking that the trees be saved was circulated and presented to Mr. Hoffman. He acceded to the wishes of the petitioners and ordered the work stopped. A portion of one of the trees was cut down but the remainder of the trees, as well as the other two, will be left and the cement walk which is to be put down there will be built around the base of the trees. The petition presented to Mr. Hoffman is as follows:

CHARLES DAVIS ACCUSED OF RUSTIN'S MURDER

Omaha, Sept. 11.—"That looks like the man I saw coming from the Rustin home on the night of the murder," said Dr. J. P. Ford to the police when Charles F. Davis, under arrest charged with the murder of Dr. Frederick T. Rustin, was brought before the court today for arraignment. He pleaded not guilty and was released on \$5,000 bail.

Frank Graham, auditor of the Omaha National Bank, will probably be the strongest and main witness for Davis in establishing an alibi. Graham lives at the Chatham and has rooms adjoining that occupied by Davis. On the night Rustin was murdered he was awakened by some one vomiting in Davis' room. He got up and looked at his watch and it was just 3 o'clock he says. The shooting occurred about 3 o'clock and Davis' room is two miles from the Rustin home.

GRANGE FAIR AT GRESHAM THIS YEAR
