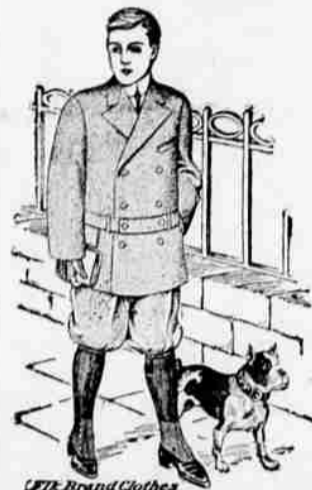

REMEMBERED BIBLE SCHOOL IN HIS WILL

Lorell McCall, the young man who died at the home of his aunt, Mrs. L. B. Rowland, in Portland Thursday, and was buried at Pleasant Hill this afternoon, remembered the Eugene Bible School, in his will. Dean E. C. Sanderson received word to that effect from Portland this morning. It is not known what amount was left to the institution, as the will has not yet been read. The young man worked a good many years at the printer's trade until a boat year ago, when he was compelled to give it up on account of bad health, and had a considerable sum of money saved, besides possessing some property.

MAY PETITION TO CUT TREES DOWN

Quite a number of merchants refused to sign the petition to Henry Hoffman asking him to allow the giant maple trees at the Hoffman corner remain for the reason that to permit shade trees to grow on the principal business streets smacks of provincialism and that they are out of place on a busy thoroughfare such as Ninth street. There is some talk of getting up a petition to present to the city council asking that body to order the removal of the trees. They will have to be cut down in time, and now, as the cement walk is being put down, it is argued, will be the best time.
