### COUNTY CLUB LIVESTOCK SHOW IN PORTLAND

 Portland, Sept. 14.—The Portland County Club and livestock show opens next Monday and continues all week. It will be the largest showing of livestock ever gathered in the Northwest, not excepting the marvelous exhibit at the Lewis and Clark exposition. The speed contests will be extraordinary; the mile track is without a parallel in the American continent. The transportation facilities to and from the grounds will be excellent, as both steam and electric roads will carry the thousands. The beautiful amphitheatre built upon steel trusses, the first of its kind in Oregon, is already completed.  
 The state fair opens today under the most favorable auspices. The buildings and grounds are in "apple pie" order, and exhibits in all departments superior.  
 Every community in Oregon should be represented at the Trans-Mississippi congress in San Francisco October 6th to 10th. Each of the commercial bodies of the state should have at least one delegate; the mayor of each city and the judge of each county have been asked to name delegates. This congress, whose sessions are second in importance only to those of the national congress, and whose deliberations have much influence upon national legislation, has held one of its most important gatherings in Oregon, while citizens of this state have held the highest offices within the gift of the organization.

 tain the prosperity we have, and execute the promises of reform it renders? No proof whatever of that is offered. All the evidence we have is the other way. The majority of us have not forgotten the second administration of Grover Cleveland, which ended only on the fourth of March, 1897. The Democracy then had its opportunity to show the world what it could do with government, for it possessed the executive office, a majority of the senate and a majority of the house. Its opportunity to exercise that control for the public benefit was wasted. Discord and confusion reigned throughout the entire four years. Irresponsibly to reach political conclusions or to take any effective action was demonstrated. No promises were kept, no reforms were accomplished.

### BIG LAND SALE IN DOUGLAS COUNTY

What is considered the biggest deal in farming lands ever made in Oregon was consummated in this city yesterday in the transfer of 4000 acres of Douglas county soil for \$200,000. The seller is Frank Waite, of Roseburg, and the buyers A. H. Perkins, of Medford, and J. M. Johnson, an Indiana capitalist. The tracts involved are the 2800-acre farm of Mr. Waite and the Curry place of 1200 acres near by. Both tracts are situated in the Umpqua valley, and lie contiguous to the Southern Pacific railroad. The land has been in cultivation for years and is now considered in a high state of productivity.  
 The buyers intend subdividing the farms into 10 and 12-acre tracts and setting out fruit trees, for which the soil is considered admirably adapted. The improved acres will then be sold to farmers from the East and elsewhere, who will apply intensive methods to farming and fruit-growing.—Portland Telegram.
