### CITY COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

The regular meeting of the city council was held last night at which time a large amount of business was transacted.  
 After the reading of the minutes, E. Schwarzschild addressed the council on the pure food laws and the necessity of enforcing them. He presented a petition signed by 130 persons asking for pure milk, pure meat and a public abattoir. The petition was referred to the committee on health.  
 An arc light was ordered placed at the intersection of East Tenth and Pearl streets.  
 The street committee was directed to replace the hitching posts around the county parks that were taken down when the paving work began on the park streets.  
 J. H. Coleman was granted permission to place an electric light sign in front of his block on Willamette street.  
 The health committee reported that the blasting matter had been settled to the satisfaction of all concerned.  
 The argument in favor of the \$500,000 water bonds proposition was ordered printed and the recorder was directed to give proper notice of the election through the newspapers. The following judges and clerks of election were appointed:  
 First ward—S. W. Taylor, S. R. Williams, P. J. McPherson; Second ward—A. A. Simmons, J. Frank Ross, W. J. Warnock; Third ward—W. G. Martin, W. W. Moore, A. C. Jennings; Fourth ward—A. N. Striker, S. M. Moran, G. E. Hurd.  
**Near Beer Ordinance.**  
 An ordinance prohibiting the sale of non-intoxicating malt liquors was unanimously passed, Moon and Fisher being absent at the time the vote was taken. The ordinance was ordered printed in the newspapers. It appears in another column of today's Guard.  
 An ordinance licensing street vendors of ice cream, pop corn, etc., was reported on. The proposed license is fixed at \$10 for vehicles and \$7.50 for receptacles other than vehicles.  
 The city attorney was directed to prepare an ordinance allowing the University to put in a walk along the southeast side of Eleventh street four inches above the regular grade.  
**Petitions.**  
 A petition to remove the big maple trees from Ninth street at the Hoffman House and a counter petition to let them stand were read and referred to the street committee with power to act.  
 The committee was also given power to act in the removal of the trees

at the corner of East Ninth and Oak streets.  
 A petition for stretching wires for electric lights from the Campbell-Fellman furniture store to J. Goldsmith's cigar store was granted. This is a private electric light plant to be put in by the Campbell-Fellman Company.  
**Other Matters.**  
 The hay scales of the Bangs Livery Company were ordered taken out and placed on a level with the pavement.  
 On the opening up of Olive street south of Twelfth the street committee was appointed to assess the benefits, on \$500 damage allowed by the jury to H. R. Kincaid, and by resolution the committee will be re-appointed.  
 The question of acquiring the Hyland property to connect Olive street with the railroad right of way was discussed and the committee was instructed to make some kind of a proposition to Mr. Hyland before condemnation proceedings were commenced.

### ORDINANCE PROHIBITING SALE OF "NEAR BEER."

To prohibit the sale of non-intoxicating malt liquors in the city of Eugene.  
 The City of Eugene does ordain as follows:  
 Section 1. The sale of non-intoxicating malt liquors in the City of Eugene is prohibited and declared unlawful.  
 Sec. 2. Any person, firm, company or corporation, or any agent of any person, firm, company, or corporation who shall sell or barter any non-intoxicating malt liquors in the city of Eugene, or who shall give away any such liquors with intent to evade this ordinance, shall be deemed a misdemeanor.  
 Sec. 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200, or be imprisoned in the city jail not less than ten days nor more than 30 days; and in case of punishment by fine, if the same is not paid, the said person shall be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each \$2 of said fine, and may be sentenced to labor one day for each \$2 of said fine, on the streets or other public works of the city under the charge of the street commissioner.  
 Sec. 4. The provisions of this ordinance being necessary for the public health, peace, and safety of the people of the city of Eugene, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.  
 Passed Sept. 14, 1908.

### PROBABLY FIGHT NEAR BEER ORDINANCE

**BREWERS MAY TEST LEGALITY OF NEW CITY LAW IN COURTS—WERE DOING BIG BUSINESS IN EUGENE**  
 The city council last night passed a law prohibiting the sale of non-intoxicating malt liquors in Eugene, which affects the sale of "near beer," which has been sold at several cigar stores and soft drink places during the summer. Each dealer who has handled this beverage has done a big business with it from the start, as it tastes very much like the real beer and has just enough alcohol in it to cause an exhilarating effect if one drinks several glasses at one time.  
 One dealer early this morning, after it was learned that the ordinance had passed, telephoned to the Roseburg brewery cancelling his order for several kegs of the "near beer," but the brewer replied that the shipment had already been made. He said he would come to Eugene on the first train and secure a lawyer to see if the legality of the ordinance could not be tested in the courts. Other brewers who furnish the Eugene trade will probably co-operate with this Roseburg brewer in trying to knock the ordinance out.
