## DYAMITE CAR EXPLODES KILLING STATION AGENT

Windsor, Mo., Sept. 15.—A car of dynamite standing on the track in front of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad depot exploded this morning. The car and depot were demolished and 15 persons, standing nearby were more or less seriously hurt. Frederick Yake, agent of the Missouri Pacific railroad at this place, was killed.

An unknown laborer was also killed, and D. E. Hall, a druggist, and an unknown tramp have died of their injuries. This makes four fatalities in all.

## BIG FIRST DAY AT STATE FAIR

Salem, Sept. 10.—The forty-seventh annual Oregon state fair opened its gates to the public yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, and for the next five days there will be hurry and hustle and the largest crowds of the fair's history inspecting the greatest collection of livestock, dairy, horticultural, agricultural, floral, poultry, women's work, industrial work and machinery ever brought to any state fair on the Pacific coast.

The attendance on the opening day is always lighter than any other day in the week, and yesterday the crowd at the political meeting had its effect on the gate receipts, but in spite of all the concessionaires, who notice the crowds from the dollars and cents standpoint, stated last evening that it was a better "first day" than any previous year. And the gate receipts showed it, too, the total running over \$3000.

## NEWS NOTES FROM LANE COUNTY COAST

(Special Correspondence.)

Florence, Sept. 15.—Percy Collier cut his knee quite badly while axing on his father's surveying crew in the mountains near Heeeta Head. Nine stitches were taken to close the wound. He will remain at E. R. McCormack's, on the North Fork, until it is safe to make the trip to Eugene.

Salmon fishing is very poor so far and many of the fishermen are worried as to the prospects of their usual income.

The sawmill at Florence is expected to close in about three weeks because of a lack of logs.

The schooner Oakland, loaded with lumber since Saturday and bound for San Francisco, has been waiting for the fog to rise on the bar in order to get out.

**LITTLEFIELD DEFENDS SPEAKER OF HOUSE**

New York, Sept. 14.—The action of the Methodist denomination in opposing Speaker Cannon on the ground that he strangled the Littlefield bill, which was designed to prevent the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition districts, has called forth a letter from Congressman Littlefield to Mr. Cannon in which he says:

"Doubts Validity of Bill

"As to the Littlefield bill, which I was not able to get reported from the committee at the last session, no one has any authority from me to hold you responsible for that result. I suppose I ought in fairness to say this bill raised some grave and close constitutional questions. While I feel that the bill would be sustained and I think I ought to pass, the question is by no means free from doubt and I would not for a moment think of intimating that those who take the opposite view are insincere or dishonest. In fact, some of the ablest lawyers that I know entertained that view. While I do not remember to have ever discussed this phase of the question with you, that I understand to be your view.

"It is not to be assumed, I take it, that when a member is elected speaker he ceases to have opinions and is deprived of the right to express and maintain them that other members enjoy, without subjecting himself to the question of being a dictator of the house or reproached with a lack of virility. The election of a speaker should not, in my judgment, emasculate either the speaker or the house. That intelligent, conscientious and earnest men should disagree upon important questions is, I take it, inevitable."

Fire practically wiped out Pokenama, the terminus of the Klamath Lake railroad in Klamath county, Friday night. The depot, warehouse, store, postoffice and office of the Algoma Lumber Co. were burned to the ground. The loss of goods will amount to \$4000 and the buildings were worth \$5000.
