EUGENE SCHOOLS WILL HAVE MUCH LARGER ATTENDANCE

Eugene will have 2500 students enrolled in her various schools when the fall terms are well opened. The largest enrollment in the history of the institutions is confidently expected by the several schools that are situated here. The only one to open thus far is the Eugene Business College, with an attendance of 50 per cent greater than last year.

The Eugene public schools will open on September 21. The high school expects to have an enrollment that will exceed any high school in Oregon outside of Portland. The Catholic school will open about the same time with a considerable increase in attendance over last year.

The Eugene Bible University opens in its new quarters on September 22, with a considerable increase in attendance assured.

The University of Oregon will open the same week with the largest freshman class in the history of the University, and with a probable enrollment of over 500.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS; FIFTEEN THOUSAND PEOPLE

At the regular monthly meeting of the Commercial Club last night it was unanimously voted to continue the promotion work for another year and decided that \$15,000 be raised with which to carry on the work. Fifteen thousand population by January 1, 1919, will be the slogan for the campaign during the year.

The matter of continuing the work so well commenced was discussed at length at the meeting, and every one who spoke was enthusiastically in favor of it. Messrs. Svarverud, Moran, Dempster, Campbell, Wintermeier and others made enthusiastic addresses. When it came to a vote there was not a dissenting voice.

The officers of the club and the board of governors were authorized to lay plans for raising money and carrying on the work of promoting the city's welfare and exploiting its advantages as a place of residence.

The club endorsed the proposition of the Southern Pacific Company to conduct a demonstration train through the valley, demonstrating dairying, etc.

W. M. Green, W. A. Bell and W. J. Gibson were appointed as a committee to co-operate with the Lane County Horticultural Society to arrange for an apple exhibit from Lane county at the Seattle exposition, the matter having been suggested by Fruit Inspector Beebe.

The club confirmed the appointment of D. A. Paine and J. H. Hartog, made by the governor, as delegates to the Trans-Mississippi congress. President Williams will name four delegates from the club, one of them to be President Campbell of the University.

R. R. Knox's resignation as secretary of the club was accepted, as he has gone to Albany to reside. His successor was not selected.

Manager Hartog stated that he had received word from the S. P. Co. to the effect that as soon as plans are completed for beautifying and parking the depot grounds the company would begin the work. Flower beds and rare bushes will be planted. The amendment to increase the membership from \$10 to \$20 was laid on the table. The membership is now 235, with nine applications pending.

TURPENING ATTACKED BY THREE BEARS

BOY HAD EXCITING EXPERIENCE BUT KEPT HIS NERVE AND KILLED ALL OF THEM

W. J. Hill, of the Hill Gun Store, Charles E. Jones, of the Pacific Monthly, and young Turpening returned last evening from their hunt on Huckleberry mountain, on the North Fork of the Willamette river. They got plenty of deer and a number of bears which attacked him. He saw two cubs up a tree and shot one dead. The other one he only wounded and it set up an outcry. Turpening expected to have an encounter with the mother of the cubs, but was not looking for three to come after him. The first one that came he killed with the first shot and the second one he badly wounded, but when the third one came upon him the shell stuck in the gun and he had to run. He climbed to the top of a big rock and soon afterward getting the shell out he began to pump lead into the bear, dispatching it in quick order.

Young Turpening is a high school student and is aged only 17 years. He kept his nerve splendidly through the trying experience and was cooler than many an older and more experienced hunter.

FAMOUS MINSTREL FATALLY STRUCK AT EMMETT, IDAHO

Emmett, Idaho, Sept. 15.—H. Henry, the well-known veteran minstrel man, who has mining interests at Pearl and Horseshoe Bend, making his home at the latter place, was stricken Tuesday with apoplexy, and little hope is entertained of his recovery. Dr. Platt, of Marsh, was summoned and is doing everything possible for Mr. Henry, but states that his patient is in an extremely critical condition.

Dr. Platt reports that Mr. Henry's right side is entirely paralyzed and he is entirely helpless. He is not responding to treatment and is gradually growing weaker, his age being a strong influence against his recovery.
