Sometimes a clock does not run—sometimes a store's ad does not run. A "run-down" clock or ad are about equally unsatisfactory, unserviceable, misleading.
Curious thing about it is that a merchant who would think it absurd to have a run-down or out-of-repair clock will, sometimes, deliberately let his ad stop running. It's not wise, nor good business, nor defensible on any known grounds—but it is sometimes done.

John G. McCullough.
John G. McCullough, former governor of Vermont and prominent in financial circles in New England, was born September 16, 1835, near Newark, Delaware. He graduated from Delaware College in 1855 and from the law department of the University of Pennsylvania in 1858. A year later he removed to California and began the practice of law in Mariposa county. In California he served as a member of the state legislature, state senator and attorney-general. From 1863 to 1867 he practiced law in San Francisco. In 1874 he removed to Vermont, of which state he subsequently became governor, serving from 1902 to 1904. Mr. McCullough for many years has been prominent in railroad and financial circles. For a number of years he has been president of the Chicago & Erie railroad and has served as a director in several other large systems.
Remedy for Blasting.
Editor of The Guard:—Seeing the trouble they are having in blasting at the rock quarry, I thought I would give a remedy that I have seen tried and have found it successful. Take small poles about two inches in diameter and weave them together with a rope about three feet wide and six feet long and lay them on the blast. It will keep the rock from scattering.
