### HOBO GETS 30 DAYS FOR STEALING CLOTHES

J. W. KELLY ARRESTED FOR RUNNING AWAY WITH FOOTBALL PLAYERS' CLOTHING.

J. W. Kelly, a hobo, was sentenced to thirty days in the county jail this morning by Justice of the Peace Bryson for the theft of some clothing from Fred Moulton and Bill Main, the football players, who are now on an outing up the McKenzie. He broke into the house occupied by Moulton & Main in the J. S. Luckey yard and took several articles of clothing. Word of the theft was phoned down the line and it was learned that the miscreant had been captured at Albany with the goods on him. The Albany Herald of yesterday, tells of the arrest as follows:

Loaded down beneath the weight of three coats, two pairs of trousers and two overcoats, Mike Kelly, a tramp, was arrested here this morning by Constable Catlin, as he alighted from Southern Pacific train No. 16. As a result of Kelly's arrest, Frederick C. Moulton and "Bill" Main, football stars attending the University of Oregon, will receive their clothing.

Moulton and Main rent two rooms of Jeweler Luckey in Eugene and are now absent in the mountains training down for the football season. Last night a thief entered their house and helped himself to all their extra winter clothing. Numerous letters on the clothing addressed to both Moulton and Main served to identify the owners of the clothing which Kelly wore.
