MOHAWK LUMBER CO'S MILL AT DONNA SOLD

J. S. MAGLADRY AND JOHN F. KELLY SELL OUT TO ATURSON, KANSAS, MEN, WHO TAKE POSSESSION OF THE PLANT IMMEDIATELY.

J. S. Magladry and John F. Kelly have sold the sawmill of the Mohawk Lumber Co. at Donna, on the Wendling branch of the S. P. Co. to David and H. C. Auld, of Atchison, Kansas, who will take immediate possession. Included in the sale are 3000 acres of land, all the lumber on hand and the logging machinery. There are approximately 200,000,000 feet of growing timber on the land that has changed ownership. The consideration is not given out for publication, but it is said to be in the neighborhood of \$175,000.

This mill was built about two and a half years ago by Messrs. Magladry and Kelly and has a capacity of 35,000 feet of lumber per day. It is a modern plant in every respect, one of the best in the county.

The new owners of the mill are thorough business men and will doubtless succeed in their new venture. The former owners are among the best known lumber men in the state.
