RAILROAD WORK

NEARS MONROE

Monroe, Or., Sept. 21.—The grade of the Corvallis & Alsea railroad is completed as far south as Monroe, and the track will soon be laid to that point.

The surveyors are now working on the Lake Creek spur and are locating an almost new line from the original survey.

Work will be rushed on this part of the road, as the Southern Pacific Company is anxious to begin handling the great stand of timber in the Triangle Lake country.

While it is the idea here that the road will be extended south to Eugene, it is also believed that no more work in that direction will be prosecuted until the west spur is completed.

It is planned to have a big day in Monroe when the line shall have been completed to this point.

BUILDING CONCRETE DRUG WAREHOUSE

The Linn Drug Company has let the contract to T. H. Ellis, the cement contractor, for the erection of a concrete warehouse in the rear of the company's store on Willamette street, and the work was commenced this morning. The building will be one story high and 24x65 feet in dimensions. It will take the place of the small corrugated iron warehouse which has been in use for many years and which has become too small.

TODAY'S NEWS IN BREVITY FORM.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 22.—The supreme senate of the Ancient Egyptian Order, a fraternal organization with a considerable membership, began its annual session here today.

Helena, Mont., Sept. 22.—The Northwest division, United Confederate Veterans, assembled for its seventh annual reunion in this city today. Major General Paul A. Fuzz presiding.

Waterloo, Ia., Sept. 22.—The tenth annual meeting and tournament of the Iowa Chess Association began in this city today with a good attendance of expert players from various points throughout the state.

Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 22.—A good attendance marked the opening here today of the annual meeting of the North Carolina Postmasters' Association. The session will continue over tomorrow and an interesting programme will be carried out.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 22.—A large and brilliant audience attended the opening last night of the new Biyora Opera House here. The theatre which is under the Greenwald management, is one of the largest and handsomest in the South.

Marshall, Minn., Sept. 22.—White ribbon delegates from all over the state have gathered here for the annual convention of the Minnesota W. C. T. U. An attractive programme covering three days has been prepared.

London, Sept. 22.—It is stated that King Peter of Serbia will pay a visit to England next summer. His Majesty is so convinced of the security of his position that he has arranged a tour of various capitals, including St. Petersburg and Paris.

Fargo, N. D., Sept. 22.—Many visitors are in the city for the annual convention of the North Dakota Baptists. Several prominent leaders of the denomination in other states are among those in attendance. The convention will remain in session Friday.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 22.—The fifty-third annual convention of the American Association of General Passenger and Ticket Agents began in this city today and will continue over tomorrow. George T. Bell, of the Grand Trunk Railway, will be elected to the presidency of the association and will be the first Canadian to hold that office.

Paris, Sept. 22.—Statistics supplied by the Paris sanitary veterinary department with regard to the consumption of horse and ass flesh show that last year 61,803 horses and 1,190 asses were slaughtered for distribution among 700 retailers of horse-flesh in Paris and the suburbs.

Madison, Wis., Sept. 22.—Republican candidates for the Wisconsin legislature and the nominees for state offices met in convention here today to adopt a platform. The organization of the new state committee is awaited with interest as the selection of the chairman is expected to show whether the LaFollette or the Davidson-Connor faction is to remain in control of the party.

Budapest, Sept. 22.—The annual session of the International Law Association began in this city today with the delegates present from many countries. Among the topics that the association has scheduled for its discussion this year are international arbitration, international aspect of workmen's compensation, extradition treaties, unification of the law of bills of exchange, double taxation, territorial waters, jurisdiction in divorce, and international regulation of road traffic.

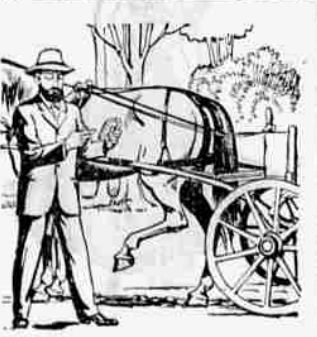
