## VETERANS HAVE BIG PARADE ON THE STREETS

SCHOOL CHILDREN TURNED OUT AND GREETED THEM AS THEY PASSED IN LINE—A BIG DINNER TODAY AT NOON AND A CAMPFIRE TONIGHT

A hundred old soldiers were in the line of parade on the Willamette street this morning. The veterans formed the line at the W. O. W. hall at 11 o'clock, and coming down West Eighth street turned south on Willamette. A halt was made at Ninth street awaiting the arrival of a column of school children which had been detailed to form a line and salute the veterans as they marched by. All the pupils of the Central school were marched down town and formed a line in front of the Commercial Club building and other buildings in that block. The pupils of the Catholic school were in line further down the street. As the old soldiers passed them the children greeted them with waving of handkerchiefs and hats and the veterans responded with cheers. It was a touching sight and was an innovation.

Returning to the hall the veterans found awaiting them a sumptuous dinner, which had been prepared by the Women's Relief Corps.

Notice is hereby given that on the 1st day of October, 1908, at each of the polling places hereinafter named, a special election will be held in and for said City, whereat will be submitted to the legal voters of said City for approval or rejection, A BILL, proposed by the Common Council of the City of Eugene, for a law to amend Sections 108 and 112 of the Charter of the City of Eugene, being Chapter 252, of the laws of the state of Oregon for the year 1905, entitled, "An act to re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 18, 1905, as amended by the people of the City of Eugene April 18, 1905, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," and A BILL, proposed by the Common Council of the City of Eugene, for a law to amend Section 109 of the charter of the City of Eugene, being Chapter 252, of the laws of the State of Oregon for the year 1905, entitled, "An act to re-incorporate the City of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 18, 1905, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," which said bills were each proposed and ordained by the Common Council of said City July 15, 1905, and on said day filed with the Recorder of said City, which election will be held at 8 o'clock in the morning and will continue until 7 o'clock in the afternoon of said October 1st, 1908.

## Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers

Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore under a law passed by the last legislature of this state taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party. Section 27 of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out and issue a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property," and section 38, in part, reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum. Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such date a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property. To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once. H. L. BOWEN, Sheriff and Tax Collector.

## Notice of Sale of Warrants

Pursuant to authorization duly given by the voters of School District No. 4, of Lane county, Oregon, at an election duly held in said district on the second day of May, 1908, the directors of said district will issue and sell the negotiable, interest-bearing warrants of the district to the amount of \$15,000.
