FORCE S. P. TO RUN TRAINS ON S.—W. BRANCH

Salem, Sept. 24.—The railroad commission has requested Attorney-General Crawford to start suit by mandamus or otherwise to force the Southern Pacific to operate trains between Tallman and Crabtree on the Springfield-Woodburn branch. The bridge between these towns over the South Santiam has washed out several times. Since the last time, about two years ago, the Southern Pacific has made no attempt to build it up again.

Tallman is now reached via Albany on the Corvallis & Eastern, and Crabtree by the Springfield branch. For a distance of seven miles between the two places there is no longer any train service. The farmers along this line complained a short time ago and a hearing was held at which the railroad commission found that circumstances warranted a service over the disused section of track.
