

CONVENTION OF UNEMPLOYED OPENS

New York, Sept. 25.—The second national convention of the unemployed opened in this city today and will continue until some time next week. The gathering has been arranged by J. Eds. Howe, the "friend of the homeless," and several other philanthropists of a practical or impracticable turn of mind. The promoters of the convention declare that great benefits will result from the proceedings. The various presidential candidates have been unable to accept the invitation to address the convention, but it is expected that other representatives of the several parties will speak.

ROOSEVELT HAS NO USE FOR CARD INDEX OF VOTERS

Washington, Sept. 23.—The card index system is fine for a government department, but in heaven's name let's get to work and pump some hot, red blood into this campaign. Never mind card indexing the people to find out how we think they ought to vote. Let's get out with red fire and stump talk and bands of music and expense money and stir 'em up so that they do vote. In heaven's name, November is almost here.

These words were used by President Roosevelt in criticism of the work of Republican National Chairman Hitchcock, according to a cabinet officer who is talking today of the president's attitude in the Taft campaign. The cabinet officer does not like Hitchcock.

He says the president's word led to the appointment of Senator Crane of Massachusetts as pilot of the Taft campaign.

The cabinet officer explained that Hitchcock is the youngest man that has ever been trusted with the responsibilities of a big campaign, and that the Republican leaders were harsh in their criticism of the card index.

The president put an end to the immense card index that Hitchcock was planning by pulling the wire and starting things in a lively way.

GENERAL NEWS FORECAST OF THE COMING WEEK.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 26.—The middle West will be the political arena of the coming week. William J. Bryan, the Democratic candidate for president, will spend the greater part of the week in that section and Mr. Taft, the Republican nominee, will be heard in various places in the Dakotas, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado and Kansas.

James S. Sherman, the Republican candidate for vice-president, will begin a Western tour at Chicago on Monday, when he will speak under the auspices of the Hamilton Club. John W. Kern, the Democratic candidate for vice-president, will begin the week in northern Ohio. On Wednesday he is scheduled to speak at the Michigan Democratic convention in Saginaw. Thence he will start on an extensive Southern trip, beginning his engagement at Birmingham Friday and speaking in Macon the following day.

During the week the Democrats and Republicans of Michigan will hold their State Conventions to ratify the results of the recent primaries and to adopt a platform. The Democrats will meet in Saginaw Wed-

nesday and the Republicans will meet a day earlier in Detroit. State tickets will be announced in Massachusetts by both parties. The Republicans will name Lieutenant Governor Draper for governor and the only contest will be over the nomination for lieutenant governor, for which place there are three aspirants. The individuals are that State Senator James H. Fisher will be the Democratic candidate for governor.

Many eminent scientists of American and European will be heard at the International Tuberculosis Congress in session in this city.

The Atlantic Interscholarship fleet is due to reach Manila next Thursday. Recent advice from the Philippine capital tell of elaborate arrangements made there for the entertainment of the officers and men of the fleet.

The assembling of the Danish parliament on Monday will attract international attention owing to the complicated political situation there as a result of the disclosures of the extensive frauds committed by M. Alberti, the ex-minister of justice.

A number of financiers and other men of national prominence will address the annual convention of the American Bankers' Association, which will meet in Denver on Tuesday. Other important conventions of the week will be the National Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque, the convention of the League of American Municipalities at Omaha, and the annual meeting of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers at Saratoga.
