MANY OREGON TOWNS WANT GRAVITY SYSTEM

(Oregon Daily Journal) La Grande will spend \$175,000 for a water and sewer system. The bonds were voted over a year ago, and have been recently sold in Chicago. The water will be secured from a pure, adequate mountain stream, at a point 17 miles from the city, and will be brought in an immense flume to a reservoir, and will be sufficient for many years to come. Surplus flow will be used to operate a modern, complete sewer system. There will be enough water for fire-fighting purposes and also for power for electric lighting, and for commercial purposes, so that the city will get revenue not only from water consumers, but from power consumers. It will run its own lighting plant also. This is the way to do things. Thus a city grows and becomes worthy to grow—so long as such enterprises are conducted on the square, are free from graft, and partisan politics is eliminated from them. THIS IS MY 68TH BIRTHDAY Henry N. MacCracken, Henry M. McCracken, chairman of New York University, was born in Oxford, Ohio, September 27, 1840. He graduated at Miami University in 1867. Subsequently he studied at the United Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and at Tobington and Berlin Universities. From 1867 to 1881 he filled Presbyterian pulpits in Columbus and Toledo, Ohio. In 1881 he became chancellor of the Western University of Pennsylvania, and remained there three years. His next position was that of vice chancellor and professor of philosophy in New York University, and in 1891 he became chancellor of the university.
