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O. A. C. REPORTS RICHEY CREEK WATER ABSOLUTELY PURE

University of California Department of Hygiene Berkeley, Sept. 10, 1908. Dr. W. L. Cheshire, Eugene, Oregon. Dear Sir:—Your letter of the 4th inst. and samples of water have arrived. I am sorry to say that a bacteriological examination of a sample of water which had been shipped so far would be of no account whatever to you. The changes that take place in water during an interval of this length would make any results that we might obtain by an examination now no index whatever of the condition of the water at its source.

It is possible that a chemical examination could be made which would be of service to you. If you will write to Professor G. E. Colby, of this university, he can probably give you some information about the matter. Yours very truly, MARGARET HENDERSON.

(The above letter explains why the Washington University analysis showed more bacilli in the Ritchey creek sample than that of the O. A. C. at Corvallis. In the former case the water was a week or ten days old before the analysis was made, while that at Corvallis was begun the day after the water was taken from the creek.)

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CITY FATHERS TRANSACT MUCH BUSINESS

An adjourned session of the city council was held last night and several matters of more or less importance were attended to. President of the Council J. M. Williams presided at the meeting in the absence of Mayor Matlock.

The street committee made a report on the straightening of Charnelton street near West Twelfth and on improvements on West Twelfth. The matter was referred back to the committee.

The cost of paving around the parks was reported at \$18,470, and the Warren Construction Company was paid 80 per cent of same. The matter of the extension of the Jefferson street sewer and some laterals was referred to the sewer committee to secure rights-of-way over private property and it gave them power to act.

The fire and water committee was instructed to purchase enough 4-inch water pipe to replace the 3-inch pipe on West Eighth street where the new pavement is to be laid. A petition for an arc light at the corner of Thirtieth and Charnelton streets was referred to the fire and water committee.

The placing of an incandescent light at the intersection of some of the alleys in the business district was referred to the fire and water committee with power to act. The city engineer reported that Amazon creek could be properly drained at a cost of \$1000 to \$2000. The committee on health was instructed to act further with the engineer in securing more data as to the probable cost.

The proceedings in the matter of the extension of Olive street from West Twelfth to West Seventeenth was declared faulty by the city attorney, as the jury had not assessed the benefits to the various property owners and it seems to be in the same shape it was before the matter was commenced, so it was decided to leave the matter to the property owners to raise the money, \$800, and pay the money into the city treasury and a tender of it be made to Mr. Kinard.

The street committee reported that B. S. Hyland would take \$1000 for the right of way for the extension of Olive street through his property to the railway grounds, the city to pay for the paving. Both reservoirs on the butte were ordered cleaned out, and the street commissioner directed to notify the Willamette Valley Company.

An ordinance was ordered drawn for grading and graveling the alleys in the block bounded by West Fifth and West Sixth streets and Olive and Charnelton streets. An ordinance requiring cement walks in the fire limits to be made from the property line to the curb line was unanimously passed. A fish peddling ordinance was read and amended so that it shall be lawful for any one to peddle fish in Eugene without a license, and it was thus passed.
