LACROSSE TO BE PLAYED AT UNIVERSITY

Lacrosse, the famous Canadian outdoor game, will be introduced at the University this fall by Physical Director Hayward for the benefit of the students who do not take part in other sports, and to aid in the development of track men. Sticks and apparatus have been ordered, and will arrive at a later date. The game is claimed to require more skill than any of the sports except baseball. The system of working is something like basketball, but the sphere which is thrown to the goals and passed among the players is small, and is handled with long sticks. No one at the University knows much about the game except Hayward. It is quite possible that inter-collegiate contests will be held in a year or two. The fame of Canadian distance runners is said to rest on the training received in practice and games of lacrosse, for while the playing lasts two hours and the men are constantly indulging in sports of speed, the sprinting is usually for a short distance. The whole play involves endurance rather than extraordinary speed.

The funeral of Mrs. J. N. B. Fuller will be held at the family residence at the corner of East Eleventh and Mill streets tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock and the remains will be interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. D. H. Trimble will conduct the services.

N. A. Reynolds has sold his new vinegar factory building at the corner of West Second and Blair, to the Blair Street addition, to the Eugene Real Estate and Investment Company. It is not known definitely what the new owners will do with the building.

Manager Hartog, of the Commercial Club, visited Springfield yesterday and made a tour of that city to secure views for the November number of Nobody's Magazine, which will be devoted to Springfield and vicinity. A few old photographs were secured and Mr. Hartog took some new ones with his camera.
