MUNICIPAL LEAGUE CONVENES IN OMAHA

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 30.—Scores of cities throughout the country have sent representatives to the twelfth annual convention of the League of American Municipalities, which was opened in Boyd's theatre in this city today with an address of welcome by Mayor James C. Dahlman of Omaha, and a response by the president of the league, Mayor J. Barry Mahool of Baltimore. The roll call showed the attendance to be larger and of a more representative character than at any previous convention of the league.

The sessions of the convention will continue three days. Some of the more important subjects scheduled for discussion are "Home Rule for Cities," "Municipal Government by Commission," "The Liquor Problem in Our Cities," and "Uniform Reports and Accounting." The discussions will be participated in by the mayors and other officials of the numerous cities.

The subject of "Municipal Government by Commission," which is regarded as one of the foremost public questions of today, will be discussed by C. H. Huston of Cedar Rapids, Mayor Henry M. Steves of Oklahoma City, and N. Lafayette Savay of New York.

Those assigned to discuss the question of "The Liquor Problem in Our Cities" are Mayors W. A. Joyner of Atlanta, H. C. Shriver of Rock Island, Silas Cook of Erie St. Louis and J. H. Graham of Wichita.

BIG GRIDIRON TEAMS OUT TODAY
New York, Sept. 30.—The big Eastern university teams make their first appearance of the season on the gridiron today, including Yale, Harvard and Pennsylvania. Though the games are more or less in the nature of practice contests they will give the critics an opportunity to form judgment on the condition of the teams for big games to be played later in the season.

Yale's contest is with Wesleyan at New Haven. Harvard plays Bowdoin at Cambridge and Pennsylvania lines up against the University of North Carolina at Franklin Field.

CONSUL MILLER PREDICTS BETTER TIMES IN JAPAN.
San Francisco, Sept. 28.—Henry

B. Miller, American Consul-General at Yokohama, arrived yesterday for a vacation. Before returning to the Orient Mr. Miller will visit Washington. In his opinion, better times will prevail in Japan before long. The new cabinet, he says, has commenced to restore confidence abroad, and the difficulties which attended the efforts of the government to finance improvements are about at an end. Miller attributes the trouble to the Chinese boycott and a drop in the price of silver and raw silk. Japan, says the Consul-General, is preparing a reception for the American fleet with tremendous enthusiasm, and the plans are of the most lavish character.

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—Owen Moran, the popular little English fighter, who recently succeeded in staying the limit with champion Abe Attell, will meet Eddie Hanlon in a twenty-round bout before the Washington Athletic club tonight.
