## ATTEMPT TO KILL BIG OIL TRUST IS BEGUN

HEARING OF TESTIMONY IN GOVERNMENT'S SUIT IN CHICAGO—MANY ALLEGATIONS ARE MADE AGAINST ROCKEFELLER'S MONOPOLY

Chicago, Oct. 1.—The Standard Oil attorneys presented evidence before Judge Franklin Ferris today in support of their contention that the company has not been the recipient of preferential rates from the railroads in different sections of the country. Today's hearing is a phase in the attempt of the government, in a suit in chancery to have the Standard Oil Company dissolved and cease to exist as a corporation. Henry E. Felton, general traffic manager of the Standard Oil Company, was the first witness called to the stand, and will be the principal witness examined in Chicago.

The main contentions of the government are that the Standard Oil Company has been given rebates by the railroad companies; that concessions were made to it; that preferential rates were established for its advantage; that the railroad companies manipulated the open rates that the big oil company had a decided advantage over its competitors.
