# PHILADELPHIA OPENS WEEK OF CELEBRATION

Philadelphia, Oct. 5.—A superlatively man watched the heroic statue of William Penn which tops the great tower of the city hall, when the whistles and bells and cannon began to announce the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the birth of the municipality this morning. This afternoon he was almost willing to attest the statement that the bronze statue of the great Quaker actually danced for joy. Many people who passed the gorgeously decorated edifice today thought they detected an added benevolence in the features of the illustrious founder of the city.

city's invited guests. This was followed by the unveiling of a tablet in city hall courtyard to Rochambeau, the great Frenchman who gave noble assistance to the American cause during the revolution. M. Jusserand, the French ambassador to the United States, performed the unveiling ceremony.

Today's contribution to the Founders' week celebration was of such a nature as to cause the shades of the departed to hover over the city to build up which they had given their best in life, it was more than enough to interest and entertain every citizen of this city of over a million and a quarter inhabitants, and tens of thousands of strangers gathered to assist in the anniversary observance.

This afternoon was given over entirely to the military parade and review, which was witnessed by tens of thousands of spectators. Between 25,000 and 30,000 troops participated in the demonstration, including United States soldiers, sailors and marines, several regiments of the National Guard of Pennsylvania and detachments from several foreign war vessels now anchored in the Delaware.

This evening will see a big celebration in the Academy of Music, which will be attended by high government officials, governors of several states, mayors of cities and a number of invited guests.

## PORTLAND DEALERS SECURE INJUNCTION

Portland, Or., Oct. 4.—Soda fountains may bubble forth their sparkling fluids today; bootblacks may rub the public shoes to a polish; and cigar dealers may pass out fragrant weeds to fawning devotees of nicotine; even the small boy tripping homeward with happy mood from Sunday school may pause to buy a cent's worth of candy or a bag of peanuts or a bunch of grapes. Tomorrow there will assemble what is expected to be the most notable gathering of Germans ever held in the United States. This will be in commemoration of the two hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of Germantown by Francis Daniel Pastorius, and representatives of many states will participate. The corner stone of a great monument at Germantown will be laid, and there will be a parade of the German societies of Philadelphia and Pennsylvania, numbering more than 15,000 persons.
