HARRY STUCKE SHOT AND KILLED

(Continued from Page One.)
Life. Stucke a short time ago assaulted Tabor's younger brother and it is said beat him up pretty badly. This helped to increase the enmity between the two men.
Stucke was aged about 40 years and leaves a wife. Tabor is considerably younger and has a wife and two children. He is a member of one of the best families in the western end of the county and was well known in Eugene.

Sheriff Brown and District Attorney Bryson are now on their way home and are expected to arrive late this afternoon. They stopped at Hale for their mid-day meal. As Tabor furnished bonds, he was left at home

and he will be at liberty until court convenes on the first Monday of next month.

STUCKE'S WIFE TELLS ENTIRELY DIFFERENT STORY

Says Tabor Ordered Stucke and Wife Out of His Field and Turned on Them With the Gun Without Warning

Sheriff Brown and District Attorney Bryson arrived home this afternoon about 4:35 o'clock. The district attorney outlined to a reporter the testimony given at the coroner's jury. Mrs. Stucke was the principal witness. She testified as follows:

That she and her husband were going through Tabor's field on the way to the postoffice to cash a money order. Tabor was driving his cows home through the field at the same time and ordered Stucke and his wife to get out of his field. Stucke replied that they would. They then followed Tabor toward the gate.

Stucke was two feet behind Tabor and Mrs. Stucke several feet behind her husband. She stated that within ten feet Tabor turned and fired a pistol at her husband, who fell to the ground. Tabor then pointed the pistol at her, she testified, and kept her at a distance. He searched her husband, taking a pistol from his pocket. He then left, saying he would get a doctor. Stucke did not die for half an hour after he was shot. Tabor and others returned soon after he had died.

The pistol that Tabor used was a .32-calibre Iver Johnson. The bullet entered the body on the left side, high up, and striking the collar bone went down into the heart.

Two other witnesses testified that Tabor came to them and told them that he had shot Stucke. He told them that Stucke had tried to chase him out of the field and that Stucke drew a pistol on him. He stated that he shot in self-defense and asked them to go with him to the scene of the shooting.

Tabor was charged in the information with murder in the first degree and was released on \$2000 bonds. This is an unusual proceeding, but is explained by the fact that the evidence and presumption of

guilt is not strong, the statutes providing that a person charged with murder in the first degree shall not be released on bail when the evidence of guilt is strongly against him. The district attorney states that the entire community is with Tabor. The justice of the peace at first fixed his bail at \$500, but upon the insistence of the district attorney it was raised to \$2000.

Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers

Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore; under a law passed by the last legislature of this state taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party.

Section 37 of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out and issue a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property," and section 38, in part reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such date a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.

To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once. H. L. BROWN, Sheriff and Tax Collector.

WILL BUILD BIG IRRIGATING CANAL IN SHORT TIME

MCKENZIE VALLEY IRRIGATION AND POWER COMPANY MEETS AND ELECTS OFFICERS—ENGINEER WILL START ON PRELIMINARY SURVEY TOMORROW

The McKenzie Valley Irrigation and Power Company, recently incorporated at Springfield for the purpose of building a canal from Hendricks' ferry, on the McKenzie river, to the Willamette river, in the vicinity of Springfield, met this morning and elected officers as follows: J. A. Younggreen, president; N. Needham, vice president; H. Petteplace, secretary, and Wm. Platt, treasurer.

Mr. Younggreen and Mr. Needham were in the city this afternoon and called at The Guard office. They stated that they will start Engineer McArthur, of the firm of McArthur & McClain, at work tomorrow to make the preliminary survey for the canal, and after this work is done an estimate of the cost can be obtained. They intend to start the work of actual construction of the canal in a short time, possible this fall, but probably not until next spring.

Different engineers who have gone over the route of the proposed irrigating canal state that there is a natural route and that will be comparatively little construction work. The point of diversion of the canal will be on the west bank of the McKenzie near Hendricks' Ferry, and the head of the canal will be cut through solid rock.

The capital stock of the company is \$5000, one-half of which was subscribed before the company was incorporated.

PITTSBURG LOSES CHANCE FOR PENNANT

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Pittsburg was today eliminated from the National League pennant race when Chicago scored a 5 to 2 victory before a crowd which was declared to be the largest that ever paid to see a game of baseball in the world. Today's game was the final one of the season for Chicago and Pittsburg, while New York has three more to play, all with Boston. If one of these games is not played, owing to inclement weather, or for any other cause, or if Boston wins one, the pennant will go to Chicago for the third consecutive year. By winning all three, New York will exactly equal Chicago's percentage of .641.
