THIS DATE IN HISTORY

- October 5th, 1744—James McGill, founder of McGill University, born in Glasgow. Died 1813. 1777—The British, under Sir Henry Clifton, captured Fort Clinton and Fort Montgomery. 1783—Treaty of peace between Great Britain and the United States proclaimed. 1813—Moravian Town, on the River Thames, destroyed by the Americans under General Harrison. 1820—Jenny Lind, famous singer, born; died November 2, 1887. 1841—Santa Anna entered the City of Mexico. 1842—Funeral services in Boston for Rev. Dr. William Ellery Channing. 1867—Henry Timrod, poet, died. Born December 8, 1829. 1894—David B. Hill, for the third time, accepted the Democratic nomination for governor of New York. 1902—Canadian-Anstrazan cable completed from Vancouver to Fanning Island, a distance of 3455 miles.

"THIS IS MY 40TH BIRTHDAY."

Albert J. Beveridge, United States senator from Indiana, was born on a farm in Highland county, Ohio, October 6, 1842. He was graduated at DePauw University, at Greencastle, Ind., in 1865. The next year he was admitted to the bar and began the practice of his profession at Indianapolis, which city he has made his home ever since. As soon as he had reached the voting age he became actively interested in politics and before he was a resident of Indianapolis very long he became recognized as one of the leaders among the Republicans of that city. His ability as an orator as well as his prominence as a lawyer contributed much to his rapid advancement in public life. Without having held any other public office of consequence, Mr. Beveridge was honored in 1889 with election to the United States senate. In 1895 he was re-elected. Senator Beveridge in the past few years has had a national reputation as an orator and is one of the foremost speakers on the Republican side in the national political campaign now in progress.
