RUSSIAN POSITION NOT MADE PUBLIC
 St. Petersburg, Oct. 6.—No statement of the attitude of the Russian government in the Bulgarian affair is obtainable today. Diplomats are unwilling to commit themselves regarding the possibility of a Turkish-Bulgarian war, but the general impression is that Turkey will not regard Bulgaria's action, which was taken in the face of emphatic Russian protests, as a cause for war.
