FIFTEEN CAR LOADS OF P. E. & E. RAILS IN PORTLAND

"Crossings for the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railroad are in Salem and will be installed immediately," is the announcement of Frank Waters, representing the Welch interests here, says the Salem Statesman. The statement of Mr. Waters would indicate that some speedy work will be done in the near future, but further announcement as to the plans of the road are rather indefinite.

"The crossings are to be placed at Commercial and Ferry streets and at Commercial and Centre streets. I cannot say positively when actual work will commence from here. We have fifteen miles of rails in Portland which will be distributed along the line as soon as possible.

"Actual work is going on in Eugene, and the surveys of the line are nearly finished. We will go ahead as rapidly as possible, but I can make no definite announcement."

Mr. Waters states that the franchise of the company expires in April. He says he hopes work will start by the first of next month, and believes such to be highly probable.

There seem to be no new developments in the proposed line to Stayton, which the Welch people agreed to put through if the residents along the route would purchase \$100,000 of the company's bonds.
