This date in history. October 10. 1615—Champlain gives battle to the Iroquois in western New York. 1623—The Rev. John Cotton was appointed pastor of the First Church in Boston. 1738—Benjamin West, the great American painter, was born. Died March 11, 1820. 1787—Major Desbarres, the first Lieutenant-Governor of Cape Breton, retired from office. 1845—The United States Naval Academy was formally opened. 1847—Jerome Bonaparte returned to France after an exile of 32 years. 1861—Dr. Fridtjof of Nansen, the Arctic explorer born near Christiansia. 1862—Confederate cavalry under General Stuart entered Chambersburg, Pa. 1872—William H. This is my 55th birthday. Henry Wade Rogers, dean of the Yale Law School, was born in Holland Patent, New York, on October 10, 1853. He received his education at the University of Michigan, from which he graduated in 1874 and received the degree of A. M. and L. L. D. from Wesleyan University, in June, 1876, at Pennington, N. J. He married Miss Emma Ferdin Winner. In the following year he was admitted to the bar. After he had practiced for several years he was made professor of law in the law school of the University of Michigan in 1883. From 1885 to 1890 he was dean of the law school. In 1890 he was appointed President of the Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., which position he held until 1891, when he became professor of law at the Yale Law School, the 38th dean of which he became on January 1, 1904. He was chairman of the World's Congress of Jurisprudence and Law Reform, which was held at Chicago in 1893 and has held several other positions of honor. He has also written a number of books on subjects of jurisprudence.
