John Barret will speak to the people of Eugene in Villard hall at the University at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening, October 14. The subject for the evening will be "What the Pacific Ocean Has in Store for the State and the People of Oregon." No man is a better authority than John Barret.

The speaker's presence was secured through the co-operation of the University and Commercial Club. He is one of the most prominent men in the United States from an international standpoint, and stands even above national politics. At the present time he is at the head of the International Bureau of American Republics, which stands for the co-operation of all the independent American nations. In the past he has been United States minister to Siam, Argentina and Columbia.
