POLITICS AT HARRISBURG ARE LOOKING UP

SOME ENQUIRY AS TO WHEN PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION IS TO COME OFF—NEWS NOTES OF HARRISBURG.

(Special Correspondence.) Harrisburg, Oct. 10.—Political enthusiasm hereabout is conspicuous mostly by its absence. However, there are some hopeful signs afloat. Enquiries have been made of late as to when the presidential election will take place. This, as we take it, is encouraging and may lead to a big lineup then voting day comes on. In defense of this seemingly eager disposition in regard to politics, it may be said that the unusually fine fall weather has been strenuously utilized in the doing up of fall work, and the farmers claim that this course is more profitable than spouting politics. They know.

The body of J. F. Nixon, who was drowned in the Willamette river north of the city Tuesday of last week, was recovered last Saturday afternoon. It had drifted about one mile from the place where he was drowned and caught on a snag in four feet of swift running water. The coroner was present but funeral services for embalming in the Christian church here and conducted by Rev. J. S. McCallum of Eugene. Interment was made in the A. O. U. W. cemetery two and one-half miles east of this city. Mr. Nixon was carrying life insurance to the amount of two thousand dollars, which will place his wife and five children in independent circumstances.

GOGORZA, CREATOR OF BARTONE ROLES.

Emilio de Gogorza has probably created more leading baritone roles in Oratorio and Concert field of this country than any other baritone now before the public. Last season for instance, he created the part of "Eugene Onegin" in Tschalkowski's opera of that name when it was given in New York by Walter Damrosch and his symphony orchestra and did it with such remarkable success that the work was repeated shortly afterwards in New York and many other Eastern cities. He also created last winter the baritone role in Fred B. Converse's new Oratorio "Job" written especially for the Fifth anniversary of the Worcester Music Festival and which part he will sing frequently this winter. This year Mr. Gogorza is to sing at Worcester, Mass. the baritone role in Sir Edward Elgar's new oratorio, "Caractacus" and at the same place the part of the High Priest in "Samson & Delilah." Mr. Gogorza was also the baritone to sing for the first time here in Cesar Franck's "Beatitudes," when that work had its first hearing in this country. Gogorza will appear in Eugene on Friday, October 30th.

BOOTH-KELLY CO. RECEIVES FINE LOGGING ENGINE

A fine new logging engine for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co. arrived from the Baldwin locomotive works this morning and will be taken to the company's new logging railway above Weeding as soon as it can be fired up for operation under its own steam. The engine is as large or perhaps larger than the S. P. locomotive that runs on the Weeding branch and has the appearance of being very powerful. It is a wood-burner. The Baldwin company sent a man along with the engine to start it running. The new railway being built by the company will be finished before the winter rains set in. About four miles have been completed. The road is as substantial as the S. P. Co.'s branch and has the same sized rails.

GENERAL NEWS FORECAST OF THE COMING WEEK.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10.—During the coming week the theatre of warfare in the national campaign will be shifted a little farther eastward. New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and contiguous states will ring with the oratory of the foremost campaign speakers of all parties. In addition to the candidates on the two tickets, the Republicans and Democrats will marshal their best talent to the fray. Among those who will be heard nightly in cities of the East and middle West are Vice-President Fairbanks, Senator Beveridge, former secretary of the Treasury, Leslie M. Shaw, Senator Gore, Senator Daniel, Senator Borah and Governor Hughes.

The reception of the American fleet at Yokohama at the end of the week will be an event to attract international attention. The visit of the fleet will be marked by one of the most elaborate demonstrations of its kind ever given in Japan. Mount St. Mary's College, the second oldest of the Catholic colleges in the United States, will celebrate its centennial Wednesday and Thursday. Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop Falconia and other eminent prelates will participate in ceremonies. Important conventions of the week will include the International Good Roads Convention in Paris, the annual Convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association in Buffalo, Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Milwaukee, the National League of American Sportsmen at Lawton, Oklahoma, the American Meat Packers' Association in Chicago, the Association of Military Surgeons in Atlanta, the American Street and Interurban Railway Associations at Atlantic City, and the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions in Brooklyn.
