IRRIGATION MEETING SATURDAY A SUCCESS

A. P. STOVER, GOVERNMENT EXPERT, ADDRESSES GRANGERS AND OTHERS AT SPRINGFIELD—TELS OF SPLENDID RESULTS OF EXPERIMENTS IN WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

The irrigation meeting held at Springfield Saturday afternoon under the auspices of the Springfield Grange, which has recently inaugurated an active campaign for irrigation, was largely attended and those who were present say that it was the best meeting of its kind ever held in Lane county.

A. P. Stover, at the head of the irrigation bureau of the United States department of agriculture for Oregon, was the principal speaker. His address was instructive and entertaining. He exhibited charts to show the results obtained by irrigation and gave examples of the work done at the experimental tract at Hillsboro, in Washington county. On 7 1/2 acres of land last year with one irrigation 100 tons of green clover, 4 1/2 tons of cured hay, and eight tons of ensilage were obtained. This year with three irrigations 200 tons of green clover, 7 1/2 tons of cured hay and pastures from six to 2 1/2 inches were obtained. Since May 1 this tract has fed 20 milch cows and 6 hogs exclusively. On the potato patch from an unirrigated portion 2600 pounds per acre were obtained. From the portion that was irrigated once, 6700 pounds were dug and on that portion that was irrigated twice, 7500 pounds per acre. Besides that the percentage of merchantable tubers on the land that was irrigated twice was 93 per cent as against 89 per cent on the unirrigated land.

In speaking of alfalfa, Mr. Stover stated that the variety best adapted to this part of the coast is the Arabian alfalfa. On the patch raised at the experimental station there were four cuttings this year.

Prof. E. H. McAllister, of the University of Oregon, was the next speaker. From an engineering point, he said, irrigation is might arise and which might seem to stand in the way of the success of the project recently inaugurated for this portion of the valley, is a legal one, in case objections are made to water being diverted from the river and not turned back again. W. W. Calkins, A. R. Black, John H. Hartog, Geo. A. Dorris and President P. L. Campbell also spoke at the meeting. A resolution was passed by the meeting pledging support of the work started by the Springfield Grange.

BRYAN MAKES TWENTY-SIX TALKS IN ONE DAY

St. Joseph, Mo., Oct. 10.—With a record of 25 speeches delivered during the day, Colonel Bryan brought to a close in this city tonight his latest tour. The reception accorded him was a fitting finale of the unprecedented demonstrations which marked his progress through the state. Today's journey, which was through eight counties of the state, might well be called a "harmony meeting" for aboard the special train were representatives of several factions of Missouri Democrats who were outspoken in their demonstration to actively support the national and State ticket.

From the moment of his first utterance until he concluded his remarks here, Mr. Bryan declared the electoral vote of Missouri safely Democratic and he devoted considerable time to urging the people to elect the entire state ticket as well as a legislature which would send to Washington a Democratic senator. As in the speeches yesterday, he sought to instill in his hearers the fact that a Democratic victory this year means a return to prosperity. He did not overlook President Roosevelt in discussing the trust question, and read a communication from the attorney-general which he construed as a direct refusal of the government to prosecute a corporation for conducting its business in restraint of trade. Taft got his share of criticism as usual, Bryan pointing out that his Republican opponent was going around the country making promises he knew he could not fulfill.

TAFT'S MESSAGE TO PEOPLE OF SOUTH

Cincinnati, Oct. 10.—"I am going South to make a few speeches in Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia and Maryland, not so much with a view of carrying those states as to show their people that they were part of the union, and as such ought to vote for the party which will give them influence in the national which their progress, enterprise and energy entitle them." Judge Taft said this to the Taft-Sherman Club of Hyland, Ky., which came to the Sinton hotel to pledge its support. His address throughout was an expression of intense feeling regarding the political condition of the South. The South had, he said, made wonderful progress under the application of Republican principle of protection and yet it remained a perpetual asset to the Democracy of the North, to be delivered en bloc no matter what might be the issue or interest at stake. Taft blushed himself during the day in clearing up office matters preparatory to leaving Monday for a campaigning trip which will keep him constantly on the road until election time.

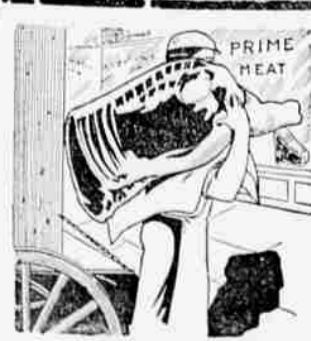

PROCLAMATION

I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of the city of Eugene, hereby notify the people of the city of Eugene, and proclaim that the bill proposed by the common council and referred to the people, to amend Sections 108 and 112 of the Charter of the City of Eugene, as amended by the people of said city April 18, 1908, by giving the Common Council the power and authority to issue and sell five per cent negotiable water bonds of the city to a sum not exceeding \$500,000 in the aggregate, voted to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon at the special election held in the city of Eugene on the first day of October, 1908, and therefore failed to become a law of the City of Eugene, the majority against the same being 158 votes.

That the bill proposed by the Common Council and referred to the people for amending Section 109 of the Charter of the City of Eugene, so as to empower the Common Council in the sale of the water bonds of the city when no bids are received for the purchase thereof at or above par at the time advertised, then the Council may negotiate and sell the said bonds or any part thereof at private sale at not less than their par value without re-advertising, submitted to the vote of the people of the City of Eugene at the special election held in said city on the first day of October, 1908, received a majority of the votes cast thereon as follows: Number of voters voting in favor of said amendment, 425; voting against said amendment, 346; majority in favor of said amendment, 79; and therefore became a law of the city of Eugene.
