CLUB TO MAKE DEPOT GROUNDS THING OF BEAUTY

COMMERCIAL BODY WILL PLANT FLOWERS, SHRUBS AND TREES—MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT TO DISCUSS MATTER—MONEY WILL BE USED FROM BOOST FUND.

At a meeting of the Commercial club last night the matter of beautifying the Southern Pacific depot grounds was the principal topic of discussion. Plans for the work were submitted and at the outset President C. S. Williams offered to head a subscription list with \$20 for the work, but D. E. Yoran suggested that if \$15,000 is raised for a boost fund the promotion department of the club could handle the matter out of that fund. That seemed to be the consensus of opinion among the members of the club present.

There are three acres to be improved. It is planned to have the entire tract sodded; flower beds will be planted near the platform and shrubs and evergreen trees will hide the water tank and pump house. Trees will also be planted along the side boundary of the grounds to hide the view of the alleys and back yards.

Some of the members of the club expressed the opinion that the city could well afford to devote a few hundred dollars to the work. Manager Hartog is in receipt of a letter from W. F. Chace, a landscape architect at Portland, stating that he will be in Eugene on October 20 to go over the grounds with Mr. Hartog and lay out more definite plans for their beautification. The promotion department will then obtain definite prices for the improvement and place the matter before the S. P. company, asking them to fill in the entire grounds if the people of the city will do the work of beautifying them. The improvements will depend, of course, upon whether or not the company will agree to maintain a gardener regularly to care for the grounds. If not, it would be money wasted.

More Police Wanted.
 A committee of three was appointed to interview the city council asking that body to increase the night police force from two to three men. The business district is growing rapidly and is now much larger than it was when the present force of two night men was put on.

Other Matters.
 A committee was named to see the council to urge the immediate inspection of wooden sidewalks, as many of them are in a deplorable condition, and to urge the extension of the cement walk district. The committee was authorized to consult the council in regard to the light supply, especially on the streets.

At the suggestion of D. E. Yoran, a committee was appointed to make a list of Eugene citizens who are not members of the club and to whom a special invitation will be given to join in order to make the club a still more powerful body for good.

Will Receive Barrett.
 Before the meeting of the club, a meeting of the board of governors was held at which Dr. L. L. Whitson, President P. L. Campbell and Dr. W. Kuykendall were appointed as a committee to receive John Barrett upon his arrival here Wednesday evening.

CALIFORNIA WOMAN DROWNS IN VAT OF WINE

Santa Rosa, Cal., Oct. 12.—George Collier, wife of a rancher at Occidental, was drowned yesterday in a vat of wine. The woman was visiting the winery on the Collier ranch and had climbed to the edge of a large vat, partly filled with wine. In some way undetermined, probably through being overcome by the fumes, Mrs. Collier lost her balance and fell inside the huge receptacle. Before assistance reached her she had been suffocated.

Several men from Coburg have recently located on homesteads near Hecker, after spending a week or so in that section.

 J. H. Miller, brother of Paquin and Geo. Melvin Miller, arrived here Friday and remained until Tuesday. He gave a short talk to the pupils of the high school and the upper classes of the intermediate department Monday afternoon at the school house. He arranged to deliver a lecture in the Odd Fellows' hall Monday evening, but the audience did not materialize.

A movement is now under way to build a telephone line from Acme by way of South Slough and thence on to Manie Creek. Orrin Stanwood is promoting the enterprise and proposes to build the line and keep it in repair. Persons wishing to connect with the wire can buy their instruments and pay him a monthly rental for the use of the line.
 Mrs. J. A. Vader, who left here a short time ago, is now in a hospital in Portland, where she underwent a surgical operation last Friday. The operation proved much more serious than was expected, as the surgeons found an abdominal tumor which it was necessary to remove. ANOTHER LOCAL OPTION CASE TO BE TRIED THIS WEEK

Sid Pitman was arrested at Springfield charged with the sale of liquor. Seavey's hop yard during picking season, in violation of the prohibition law. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Bryson this morning and pleaded not guilty. His trial was set for Friday of this week. He was placed under \$300 bonds until then. Pitman is charged with dispensing the fiery liquid that makes good men bad and bad men worse to the hop pickers at Seavey's. It is said that the "hooker" was still almost openly, and as a result there were nightly carousals among some of the pickers.

ACCUSED OF SALE OF WHEAT STORED

ALBANY FARMERS' WAREHOUSE COMPANY ACCUSED BY EUGENE MILL AND ELEVATOR CO.
 In a petition of the Eugene Mill & Elevator Company filed in the United States court in Portland by P. R. Kelly, of Albany, it is charged that the Albany Farmers' Company disposed of wheat and oats stored by the owners in a warehouse operated by the Farmers' Company, and that the latter has defrauded a number of persons by refusing to account or settle for grain so stored. It is also charged that the Farmers' Company has recently disposed of a portion of its assets by selling property to Alfred Freerakken, a resident of this county.

It is said that the Eugene Mill and Elevator Company purchased and stored 8214 bushels of wheat with the Farmers' elevator. The mill company shipped a portion of it, but claims to have had a balance due it of 2929 bushels, valued at \$2753.63, which the elevator people refused to deliver upon demand, and which has since been sold.

R. A. McLagan also joins the suit and states that he placed 1887 bushels of wheat in the elevator bins belonging to the Farmers' Company, which it sold without an accounting to him. He alleges that his grain disappeared in October of this year.

Perhaps the most serious allegation is made by William Long, a grain buyer of Eugene, who states that the Farmers' Company got away with 873 bushels of oats belonging to him and then issued a check unobtainable when the holder of the warehouse receipt presented it for settlement. He claims to have sold the warehouse receipt to J. R. Baltimore, of this city, and that the latter is holding the check, which was refused at the bank upon which it was drawn.

The petition asks that the Farmers' Company be declared an involuntary bankrupt, and that all its property be sold for the benefit of its creditors.—Alban Herald.

WOMAN SUFFRAGISTS GATHER IN BUFFALO

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 13.—Prominent woman suffragists are already arriving in considerable numbers and committee meetings are being held in preparation for the fortieth annual convention of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, which will open in this city Thursday. As a preliminary to the convention of the national body the annual meeting of the State organization convened today. The sessions of both gatherings are to be held in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium.

The sessions of the national organization will continue six days and will be presided over by the Rev. Anna Howard Shaw. A fine array of talent has been obtained to address the various meetings, consisting of prominent men and women who have become famous for their devotion and labor along different lines of human activity.

Among the scheduled speakers are Miss Jane Adams, Mrs. Florence Kelley, Charles Edward Russell, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Rev. Antoinette Brown, Blackwell, President M. Cary Thomas of Byrn Mawr College, and Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch.

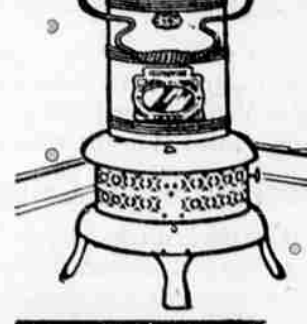
