At the meeting of the committee of the whole the matter of accepting the report was voted down and it was agreed to let the bond matter remain just where it is at the present time. At this meeting it was also voted unanimously to go ahead with the proposed power plant on the McKenzie river for the purpose of furnishing electric power for the operation of the pumping plant of the water system.
