NORTH CAROLINA

N. W. BATTLESHIP'S GIVEN TRIAL

Washington, D. C., Oct. 14.—Under orders from the Navy Department the fine new battleship North Carolina, recently completed at Newport News, Va., to proceed today to Hampton Roads for her final acceptance trial off the Delaware Breakwater. Every confidence is expressed among the department officials in the ability of the North Carolina to meet all the requirements of her contract, especially in regard to speed. For a battleship the North Carolina is expected to be very fast, as she is 502 feet between perpendiculars, 72 feet 10 inches breadth and of 14,500 tons normal displacement. The indicated horse-power is given at 23,000. According to the contract terms she is required to make at least twenty-two knots speed.

CUMBERLAND
ARMY RE-UNION

Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 14.—Within sight of Lookout Mountain, Mission Ridge, Orchard Knob and other theatres of bloody strife in which they took a leading part, the members of the Society of the Army of the Cumberland assembled in Chattanooga today for their annual reunion.

No more appropriate place for the reunion could have been selected. The capture of Mission Ridge by the Army of the Cumberland without orders, was one of the most stupendous feats of the war. At Chickamauga the army was all but demoralized, and its recovery and subsequent victories have no parallel in history. After the water that followed the battle of Chattanooga, as a part of the military division of the Mississippi, under the command of Major General W. T. Sherman, joined in the memorable campaign from Chattanooga to Atlanta, the "one hundred days under fire."

Only a small amount of routine business is to be transacted at the present reunion. After the annual reports have been received and officers elected the members will devote the time to a visit to the battlefields which were the scenes of the most stirring events of their lives.
