As the ballist starts to lead the boy away there is a muffled scream of agony from the mother. She lapses into unconsciousness. How provoking! The court must stop a few moments until a doctor called, who takes the woman away. Provoking, but—

You see, the boy is the only son of his mother, and she is a widow.

Young man— This is no fancy sketch. It is a transcript from a real life drama. The bucket shop keeper furnished the tiger. The boy furnished the food for the tiger. The judge furnished the convict and the mother the boy.
