THIS IS MY 75TH BIRTHDAY. Dennis Thompson. Dennis Thompson, the veteran actor who has won fame and fortune in his play of the "Old Homestead," was born October 15, 1833, in Erie county, Pennsylvania, and lived here until he was fourteen, when he returned to the old home of his parents in Souderton, Pa. In 1850 he went to Boston and joined a circus, subsequently developing into an acrobat, playing in comedy acts, and in 1864 went to the Royal Lyceum theatre at Toronto, where he remained until 1868. In 1875, he first appeared as Uncle Joshua Whitcomb, in a one-act piece, that name which he wrote. In 1878, in collaboration with George W. Ryer, Mr. Thompson branched his one-act piece into a play and called it "The Old Homestead." Under this title it was first produced in Boston in 1886 and for more than twenty years the veteran actor has been kept continuously in the familiar character of Joshua Whitcomb.
