#### WATER BOARD THAT WILL BE SELECTIVE

To the People of the City of Eugene: In an editorial in the Register of October 15, the editor says he understands that I am in favor of an appointive water commission. I don't know where the Register gets its information that I intend to have an ordinance passed making the water commission an appointive one, and to become the dictator to the city as to who shall be appointed on said water commission.

I have had no talk with any person about what kind of ordinance the city should pass, nor as to who should be on the water commission. I have always favored an elective board and will use my influence to have such an ordinance passed. As will give to the people the right to choose their own water board.

It is known to only in this city but all over the state of Oregon that I have always advocated the initiative and referendum; that is, that the people should choose their own officers without detraction from any day, from president to school board and water commission, and I now repeat that I will use my influence so far as in my power to have the people rule.

### Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers

Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore, under a law passed by the last legislature of this state taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by an order demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party.

Section 37 of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out an order for the certificate of delinquency against such property," and section 38 in part reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their tax on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from that date a certificate of delinquency bearing five per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.

To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once.
