RELIEF TRAIN WITH FOREST FIRE REFUGEES REPORTED DESTROYED

Alpena, Mich., Oct. 16.—According to reports coming into Alpena today from the north there was a heavy loss of life in the forest fires which yesterday and last night swept over the Presque Isle country. The most serious report is to the effect that the relief train which went to Metz last night from Hawks was burned with a number of refugees. It is impossible to secure confirmation of the report, as the wires are down to Newincke, where the train was reported destroyed. It is not yet known what became of the people reported to have been on the train, but the reports which have filtered through to this place say they are believed to have been burned to death.

A train left here this morning carrying physicians bound for the north. The fires in the immediate vicinity of Alpena receded today and the city is now out of danger. It is feared there has been much loss of life in the outlying hamlets and farms throughout the Presque Isle country.

LATER PARTICULARS

Alpena, Oct. 16.—It is known that fourteen refugees from the fire-swept village of Metz, 27 miles north of here on the Detroit and Mackinac railway, were burned to death between Metz and the village of Posen last night when the relief train was wrecked by a burned-out culvert. It is not definitely known how many were on board the relief train when it left Metz last night. Metz has one hundred inhabitants, but it is believed that many from outlying districts were on the relief train when it pulled out of Metz at midnight. Going north the train was cut off by the fire at Hawks and immediately backed toward the south, returning to the flame-ridden section from which they were fleeing to the increasing terror of the passengers. As it was rushing through the fire and smoke the train crashed into a culvert which was burned through. Many passengers are straggling into Posen this afternoon.

HEARST SERVED WITH PAPERS IN HASKELL'S SUIT

Dramatic Scene When Editor Was Apprehended on Union Pacific Train

DOOR OF STATE ROOM WAS BROKEN OPEN

Hearst Found Inside and Declared Suit Did Not Worry Him

Omaha, Oct. 16.—After a dramatic scene on the Union Pacific train last night, in which the door of his state room was burst open by a deputy sheriff, Wm. R. Hearst, the millionaire editor, was served with papers notifying him that a suit for \$600,000 damages had been filed against him for slander and libel by Governor Haskell, of Oklahoma, in Douglas county circuit court. Hearst's wife said he was not in the room and refused the deputy admittance, and when the door was burst open Mrs. Hearst, partially disrobed, rushed from the room. The door of the toilet was broken open and Hearst emerged. He afterward said that in his opinion the suit would never come to trial and that he was not disturbed because of it. He also says his previous offer to stand the cost of the suit for Haskell, if the suit was pressed, still holds good.
