PASSENGERS MUST SHOW THEIR TICKETS

Chicago, Oct. 15.—The rule requiring railroad passengers to show their tickets for inspection before boarding trains went into effect today on all the railroad lines in Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Minnesota and Arkansas. The new rule is not particularly popular with the trainmen, because it means considerable delay in boarding the trains, at least until the traveling public and the conductors shall have become thoroughly used to the new system. On the other hand the rule will prevent difficulties in paying fares to conductors in trains and will also prevent passengers from boarding the wrong trains or sections of trains. Difficulties with the conductor used to arise frequently when the passengers were required to pay their fare on the train. This has been done away with altogether, as all passengers must prove their tickets before they can board the train. From several of the large railroad centers slight delays and confusions have been reported today as a result of the enforcement of the new rule, but the difficulties were not serious and it is expected that the traveling public will soon become accustomed to the new rule.

PRESBYTERIANS OF OLD VIRGINIA

Rosnoke, Va., Oct. 15.—About two hundred ministers and elders were in attendance when the session of the Synod of Virginia opened here today. Among those who have gathered to take part in the session are many of the most distinguished ministers from Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia, as well as a fair number from West Virginia. In addition to the regular delegates the heads of the committees on the general work of the church are in attendance. The meetings are held in the First Presbyterian church, which is eminently suitable for such a gathering. Dr. Scott, of Staunton, who has been selected for delivering the opening sermon, is one of the most distinguished pulpits orators in his state. It is expected that the synod will conclude its work and adjourn next Monday evening.

KING RECEIVES AMERICAN HONOR

Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.—For the first time in history the crowned ruler of an European monarchy has been honored by being awarded an American order or decoration. The Board of Governors of the American Cross of Honor Association met here today and awarded to Victor Emmanuel III, king of Italy, a cross of honor, which will be transmitted to the king in proper form. The king was elected an honorary member of the order last February, and accepted the honor by letter on May 31, 1908. The cross of honor, is of gold and enamel, has the form of a Maltese cross, in the center of which is the American shield, while the letters A. C. H. and the date, 1906, are on the four points. The whole is encircled by a wreath of laurel. An eagle displayed holds the laurel wreath in its beak, and is suspended from a ribbon of a dark shade of blue.

Watertown, Wis., Oct. 16.—The old homestead of Carl Schurz in this city is to be put up for sale at public auction tomorrow by a small judgment. A movement has been started with good prospects of success for the purchase of the homestead of the city, and its preservation as a permanent memorial to the great German-American. The place was the first permanent home of Schurz after he came to America. He built the house shortly after his arrival in the United States in 1854 and lived there for eight years, during which time he became a national figure.
