**Fleet in Storm.**  
Tokio, Oct. 17.—The delay of the American battleship fleet in arriving at Yokohama is due to a tremendous storm off the North coast island of Luzon of a Philippine group. The storm began the morning of October 12, continued until the afternoon of the 13th. One man was drowned and some damage resulted to the fleet. The details were communicated to the Associated Press at Tokio by wireless from the Connecticut through special courtesy of the Japanese government. The fleet will arrive at Yokohama at 9 o'clock of the morning of October 18.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 17.—Asserting that she was responsible for his wife leaving him, Michael Borso, with a revolver in each hand, entered the Brown Palace rooming house today and shot Mrs. Augusta Towle through the head, killing her instantly. He then fired two more shots into the prostrate body on the floor and aimed his weapon upon himself, but his aim was bad, and the injury may not prove fatal. He fled from the house and was captured by a policeman named Hurd, who fired a shot over the fugitive's head. Borso immediately surrendered.

## TWENTY-SEVEN KNOWN TO HAVE PERISHED AND FIRES STILL RAGE

Alpena, Mich., Oct. 17.—With twenty-seven known to have perished in the Presque Isle country the forest fires are still raging uncontrolled in the counties of Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Alpena, Alcona and other scattered districts of Northern Michigan. Diligent search was begun today to determine the full extent of the holocaust, but it may take many days to reveal the tragedies likely to have occurred on the islands.

The property loss is already up in the millions. Whole villages have been blotted off the map and logging camps by the dozen destroyed with their season's output.

## MURDER MYSTERY RAFFLES POLICE OF SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 17.—By the finding of the body this morning of Phillip DeMartini, an Italian, on the sidewalk at Dupont and Pacific streets, the police are confronted with a murder mystery. DeMartini arrived in town last night and stopped with relatives at Dupont and Pacific streets and the body was found beneath the window of the room he occupied. The police say the room shows evidence of a struggle, and the theory is that he was thrown out of the window causing his death. Rosa and Antonio DeMartini, cousins of the dead man, were held pending an investigation. DeMartini's head was crushed and both arms broken.

## BELIEVE WAR NOW ALMOST INEVITABLE

Turkey Has Mobilized Army Corps for Offensive Move

Paris, Oct. 17.—The French foreign office has official confirmation of the previous reports of the mobilization by Turkey of the Anatolian army corps. This is regarded in official circles as Turkey's answer to Bulgaria's refusal to accord compensation for the Oriental railroad, and is believed to make war inevitable.

## JUDGE TAFT TO VISIT ROOSEVELT

Washington, D. C., Oct. 17.—The first personal conference between President Roosevelt and Judge Taft that has taken place since they met at Oyster Bay last August, previous to the beginning of the stamping tour of the presidential candidate, is slated to take place tomorrow. Following the close of a busy week of speech-making tonight Judge Taft will leave Richmond and come to this city to stay over Sunday. It is expected the greater part of the day will be spent at the White House, where the president and the candidate for president will go over in detail the plans that are making for the concluding two weeks of the republican national campaign.

## FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS IN WEST

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 17.—The college gridirons of the Middle West will open a number of important football contests today, the game for the most part being more important than is usually the case this early in the season. Most interest centers in the contests between Chicago and Illinois at Marshall Field and the Nebraska-Minnesota game at Minneapolis.

Other games of more or less interest that are scheduled for the day include Michigan and Notre Dame at Ann Arbor, Wisconsin and Indiana at Bloomington, Iowa and Missouri at Columbia, Oklahoma and Kansas at Lawrence, and Ohio State and Western Reserve at Columbus.

## MARTIN JURY HAS NOT AGREED UPON VERDICT

Portland, Oct. 17.—The jury in the case of Edward H. Martin, tried for the murder of Nathan Wolff, is still out at 1:30 this p. m., after nearly twenty-four hours' deliberation.

Portland, Oct. 17.—Edward H. Martin's fate was placed in the hands of the jury early yesterday afternoon. A final plea had been made for his conviction of the murder of Nathan Wolff, and Circuit Judge Cleland had given final instructions to the jury as to the manner in which they should go about solving the intricate murder mystery.

At 2 p. m. the court began delivering his charge to the jury, a process which consumed 14 minutes. The 12 men were then delivered to the custody of the hall and taken into a closed room for deliberation. They filed from the courtroom at 2:16 o'clock.

## OREGON FRESHMEN WIN GAME FROM PORTLAND HIGH

Touchdown Made by Varsity Underclassmen Against Preparatory School Team

## Varsity BEATS ALUMNI BY A PLACE KICK

Score Four to Nothing Made Against the Old Stars—

Moulten Sends the Ball Between Goal Posts

The University of Oregon freshmen won from the Portland high school in the first game of the matinee on the inside field this afternoon by the score of 5 to 0. The touchdown was made in the middle of the first half. The freshmen carried the ball by off tackle plays and short

and runs for 70 yards, when McKinley, the fullback, was sent over the line for a touchdown. Goal was missed.

In the second half Portland high had two chances to score from the 25-yard line, but the strong defense of the Oregon freshman line invariably stopped them. Features of the game were the playing of Ludlum, Portland's left end, of McKinley and Latourette, of Oregon, in the first half, and of Hixon, Oregon's left end, and Main, Oregon's left tackle, in the second half.

The first half was fast, but in the second the teams both seemed to be tired. A great deal of punting was done. Portland tried twelve or fourteen forward passes, but only worked two of them, owing to Oregon's splendid interference.

## THE ALUMNI-VARSITY GAME AFTERWARD

The alumni- varsity game after the Freshman-Portland contest was no less interesting than the first. The first half resulted in no score. Twice the alumni were within ten yards of the varsity goal but the strong defense of the latter stopped them. The alumni team seemed to outplay the varsity. Jack Latourette, for the alumni, made a brilliant run, which was a feature of the half. Michel, the varsity's left end, was perhaps the star for his team during the half. For the alumni Templeton and Zacharias played at half and Kerron at full. They made the strongest back field ever seen on the local gridiron. Five minutes from the end of the second half, Captain Moulten, of the Varsity, made a place kick from the 49-yard line, scoring four points. Hug had kicked out from the Alumni goal and Clark for the Varsity caught the ball and heeled it. Then the place kick was made. The Varsity had the Alumni near the goal twice, but failed to score. Moulten tried two other place kicks and Clark one, all from the 50-yard line. But the ball went wide of the goal posts. A feature of the half was a 15-yard buck through the Alumni center by Clark, full back, and pretty running of the varsity's young Latourette, the Varsity half back. Clark's fine punting enabled the Varsity to win, putting them in striking distance of the Alumni's goal. Final score—Varsity, 4; Alumni, 0.
