VARSITY OFFENSIVE PLAYING POOR IN SATURDAY'S GAME

Alumni Foiled Attempts of 'Varsity to Advance the Ball

DEFENSE HAS BEEN EMPHASIZED BY FORBES

Ends Lack Defensive Power For Which Oregon is Famous

The first line was gotten on the 'varsity team when they beat the alumni Saturday 4 to 0. A place kick in the last part of the second half by Captain Moulten's stub foot made the only score, but twice in the first half the old graduates swept within a few yards of a touchdown, only to be held by a stonewall of the 'varsity line.

Coach Forbes said the game was satisfactory. His team showed a very good defensive formation, but on offense could not make gains. Clark's great spiral punts of 50 yards saved the day for the students.

Taken as a whole the 'varsity squad, seventeen men being tried out during the contest, showed up better than in any first game for years. There were eight old Northwest players on the alumni team, and they outweighed the 'varsity fifteen or twenty pounds to the man.

Oregon has a good line this year, which when required to will stop the hardest rushes. Part of the game one tackle was weak, but by a change the point was strengthened so that such men as Frank Templeton, Kerron, McKinney and Zacharias could no more plunge for six or eight yards.

A weak place this year for the team may be the ends. For defensive work Michael and Hickson played a great game, the former in the 'varsity, the latter in the freshmen-Portland high game, but neither of these men have showed ability to carry the ball on offense, a thing for which Oregon ends have long been famous. Dodson, another candidate, seems more capable in offensive work, and in the short time he was in the game Saturday played well defensively. Hayes, a fourth man who is being tried out, plays with all his might, but seems to need more speed and weight.

The backfield is in a curious condition. Of the number of candidates for the backs, Clarke at full has his position cinched. Latourette, former quarter on the Portland high, played one half as halfback and Kiltz the other position. Latourette is a pigmy compared to Clarke, but possesses the faculty of running ends and putting up good interference. Hurd, another candidate, who was given a chance, had little opportunity to carry the ball. Kiltz, who played the entire game, is a very speedy, well-built man. But whatever the formation, the Oregon team could not work any kind of plays for gains Saturday, except the forward pass twice, two or three yards by Clarke, and a few brief yards on end runs. Forbes, it may be stated, has worked almost altogether on defense, so that it was not expected that the scoring machine would be very successful.

Friendly's Banquet Members of the alumni and varsity teams, together with a number of invited guests, were tendered a banquet Saturday night by S. H. Friendly, a well-known Eugene merchant, who is a member of the University board of regents. The banquet room was decorated in the college colors, and presented a scene of rare beauty.

C. N. McArthur ('01), acted as toastmaster, and responses were made by Frederick Stokely ('06), Judge L. T. Harris ('93), Henry M. McKinney ('07), J. R. Latourette ('07), Richard S. Smith ('01), Captain Fred Moulten, Trainer W. L. Hayward, Coach Robert W. Forbes, Regent S. H. Friendly, and President P. L. Campbell. Cheers were laid for 60 guests.

5 to 2 on O. A. C. So, of the alumni here Saturday said that wagers were being offered in Portland at odds of 5 to 2 on O. A. C. in the Oregon-O. A. C. contest November 21. Great confidence is felt in Coach Norcross by the would-be bettors, a thing which is justified when it is considered that the team beat the University of Puget Sound 24 to 6 Saturday.

The University of Washington also ran up a big score against Whitworth College at Seattle, indicating that their prospects are brightening. The score was 24 to 1.

Little or no comparison can be made with Oregon's team at the present time. The real worth of the 'varsity will depend upon just how hard the veterans played against the youngsters. Strange though it may seem, at no time, except for a few moments in the second half Saturday, did they seem to be worn.

However, from the status of the game this year, a great defensive team may be worth more than a swift attacking machine. Moulten's place kick from the forty-yard line recalls his feats two years ago, when at any place beyond the middle line of the gridiron, Oregon's opponent's goal was invariably in danger. Moreover, Clarke's wonderful punting will aid a defensive team, for there is only one man in the Northwest known to be his equal, and that is Waltz, the O. A. C. fullback.

Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers

Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore; under law passed by the last legislature of this state taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party.

Section 37 of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property." and section 38 in part reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such date a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.

To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once.
