DEDICATION SERVICES WERE LARGELY ATTENDED

Over Six Hundred People in Bible University Building Yesterday Afternoon

BUILDING WAS LOCKED TO ITS VERY DOORS

Addresses by Messrs. Campbell, of U. O., and Rev. Mor-ton L. Rose Excellent

The dedication services at the new Eugene Bible University yesterday afternoon were a success in every particular. There were over 600 people in the building and many who were unable to gain entrance to the library room, where the services were held, stood out in the hall ways and crowded them to the out doors. The ushers state that many who were unable to get in the building went away.

The services were carried out according to program. Rev. Morton L. Rose, pastor of the Christian church at North Yakima, Wash., delivering the principal address. President P. L. Campbell of the State University, also spoke. Both addresses were excellent. The special music prepared for the occasion was very good. In a few minutes time the sum of \$800 was raised to add to the fund for the building and equipment.

Dean Sanderson says he is very well pleased with the attendance at the services, which proved to be all that was expected and even better.

History of the School. Following is a history of the institution as prepared by O. A. Bushnell, president of the board of trustees: This growing institution, located in the city of Eugene, and adjacent to the campus of the University of Oregon, with which its relations are most cordial, had its inception in the fertile brain of President E. Sanderson, through whose efforts mainly the school has been brought to its present state of efficiency. In the autumn of 1895 articles of incorporation were obtained, with J. W. Cowles, W. H. Osburn, J. H. Hawley, J. C. Bushnell, J. D. Mathew, J. T. Callison and P. J. Flint, as board of Regents. The school opened October 6, 1895, in rented but commodious

building. From an enrollment the first year of seven, the attendance has steadily increased from year to year, the session of 1907-1908 closing with an enrollment of fifty-three, or 125 in all departments. The number of teachers has also increased to keep pace with the growth of the school. The foundation of a library was laid during the first year, which has steadily grown by donation and purchase until now contains 3000 volumes. During the summer of 1896 the opportunity of acquiring a splendid lot of ground presented itself and was promptly taken advantage of by the school, upon which have been erected three good buildings. The property now represents about fifty thousand dollars.

These things were made possible by the liberal donation of the late Mrs. L. E. Cowles, widow of the late Judge Cowles, of McMinnville. He was one of the first regents and gave the first financial encouragement to the school. At his death, Mrs. Cowles was elected to succeed him as regent, and gave \$1,400 towards the first new building, one part of which is the "Cowles Memorial Chapel." She also gave \$2,500 as nucleus for the school's permanent endowment. Others have added to this fund. Through gifts and other gifts this fund will continue to grow and increase the power of the school. In this school will go forth in coming years scores of young men fully equipped to preach the word of God.

WILL ESTIMATE COST OF CITY'S POWER PLANT

Civil Engineer F. C. Kelsey of Portland, is here for the purpose of giving an estimate of the cost of the proposed power plant to be built by the city somewhere up the McKenzie river for the purpose of furnishing electric power for the operation of the pumps of the water plant. He will also go over the water system of the city with members of the council to ascertain what extensions in mains are necessary and to see if the \$100,000 water bonds issued by the city will be sufficient for the purpose of erecting the power plant and making the extensions desired.
