## EMPEROR OF JAPAN GREETED SPERRY WITH EXTREME CORDIALTY

Tokio, Oct. 20.—The most significant event of the visit of the American fleet occurred today, when Rear Admiral Sperry, his flag officer and the captains and commanders of the sixteen battleships were presented to the emperor and empress. It was the most brilliant function the palace has ever known. The emperor assumed a most cordial manner and the empress shook hands with every officer. Through Admiral Sperry President Roosevelt sent a most cordial message with expressions for the continuance of the emperor's good health and happiness and that of the inhabitants of his realm, and expressing gratification at the opportunities afforded of the visit of the fleet to Japanese waters, and his hopes for a continuance of the cordial relations which have always existed between the two countries.

The emperor expressed his appreciation of the visit of the American fleet and receipt of the friendly message of President Roosevelt, whose sentiments he most cordially reciprocated. He expressed the hope of the successful completion of the voyage of the fleet.

The procession along the route to the palace was lined with enthusiastic Japanese and foreigners, thousands of school children cheering continuously and waving flags as the carriages passed. The presentation was followed by an elaborate luncheon at which 45 persons were present. At the end of the meal the emperor retired and meeting Admiral Sperry at the door, bade him a most cordial farewell and presented him with a magnificent silver vase.

**WELCOME MOST CORDIAL**  
Tokio, Oct. 19.—The reception accorded the American Atlantic fleet by the government and people of Japan is conceded by the American naval officers to be the heartiest and most perfectly carried out of the many receptions enjoyed by the fleet since it sailed from Hampton Roads. Rear Admiral Sperry said to the Associated Press today that he was utterly unable to say how it had been accomplished, but that the welcome given the fleet and its officers and men here had been so carefully planned and carried out to the most minute detail that a lasting impression had been stamped upon the mind of every American who witnessed it.

## KATE'S ITALIAN DUKE SAILS FOR THIS COUNTRY

Report That Dowager Queen Has Given Consent to Marriage

Turin, Oct. 20.—Duke Abruzzi is believed to have been offered for America under an assumed name.

**Dowager Queen Consents**  
London, Oct. 20.—A dispatch from Turin says the Dowager Queen has consented to the marriage of the Duke de Abruzzi and Miss Katherine Elkins. King Emmanuel's present to the bride, according to the same source, will be a diamond tiara valued at \$100,000.

**Senator Not Informed**  
Elkins, W. Va., Oct. 20.—When shown a dispatch from Turin and London, Senator Elkins said: "This information is news to my family and myself. We cannot say anything, because we do not know anything about it."

## BRYAN ACCUSES REPUBLICANS OF CORRUPT METHODS

Alton, Ill., Oct. 20.—Standing on the exact spot where Lincoln and Douglas concluded their debate in 1858, William J. Bryan, Democratic candidate for president, in a 30-minute speech here today, to an immense crowd, openly charged that the Republican party was endeavoring to purchase the election, and dare not tell in advance how much money they are willing to have on hand on election day. Mr. Bryan told his auditor that the tide was running toward the Democratic party, and referring to the straw votes taken in different parts of the country to substantiate this statement, said: "Who does Mr. Taft's position mean in regard to the campaign contributions? It means that if you know before the election what contributions they are getting, you might not vote the Republican ticket and what does that mean? Why, it means that if you vote the Republican ticket and find after the election what they could not allow you to know before, you will be sorry you voted the Republican ticket. I am going to draw the only conclusion that can be drawn here, and that is that they are doing today, and knowing what they are doing today, what they are not willing for you to know they are doing."

## BURIAL OF BISHOP POTTER AT COOPERSTOWN

New York, Oct. 20.—Imposing services marked the final entombment today of Bishop Henry C. Potter, of the Episcopal diocese of New York, who died last July at his home in Cooperstown. A great crowd assembled for the services this morning at Grace Church, the first parish in

which the bishop officiated in New York and where twenty-five years ago he was consecrated. Following the services in Grace Church, which were conducted by Bishop Gris, the final service took place in the new Cathedral of St. John, the Divine, at Morningside Heights, where the body was placed in a magnificent tomb prepared for it in the crypt. The Cathedral, which it is expected will require nearly one hundred years to complete, was the conception of Bishop Potter, and it will be his chief monument.

A note from Frank Daver, ex-speaker of the Oregon house of representatives, who has been sick at Barna for many weeks of typhoid pneumonia, says that he is sitting up every day and is getting well. Reports were that Mr. Daver was very low, but it does not appear that he is now on the road to recovery.—Oregonian.

## HASKELL LIBEL SUIT INVALID SAY ATTORNEYS

Action As Begun Does Not Conform to the Laws of Nebraska

Omaha, Oct. 20.—The \$100,000 libel suit which Governor Haskell, of Oklahoma, filed in this city last week against Wm. R. Hearst is pronounced invalid by prominent attorneys who have examined the petition.

It is pointed out that the laws of Nebraska allow no punitive damages in a libel suit, and \$300,000 of the amount asked for in the present case is punitive. It is also pointed out that the petition is not accompanied by an affidavit of the Governor or his attorney, as required by the laws of this state. Until so accompanied the suit has no standing under the laws of Nebraska.

## NIGHT RIDERS ARE UNDER TWO WELLS KNOWN LAWYERS

Union City, Tenn., Oct. 20.—Word from Reel Foot Lake says that Hon. R. Z. Taylor and Capt. Quinton Rankin, both prominent lawyers of Trion, Tenn., who were fishing at the lake, were assassinated by night riders last night. Taylor's body was found hanging to a tree trunk, and Rankin, whose hand, was not quite dead, and it is not known whether he still lives. Corporations have been sent along the bodies here.

## TYPHOON DAMAGE WAS VERY SEVERE

Amboy, Oct. 20.—The damage by Thursday's typhoon was greater than reported. In Chang Chow, three thousand houses were destroyed and 1100 killed. In Lamcheng six hundred houses were destroyed and 1200 killed. Five days ago the Lamcheng flooded and 3,000 drowned and hundreds killed at other places.
