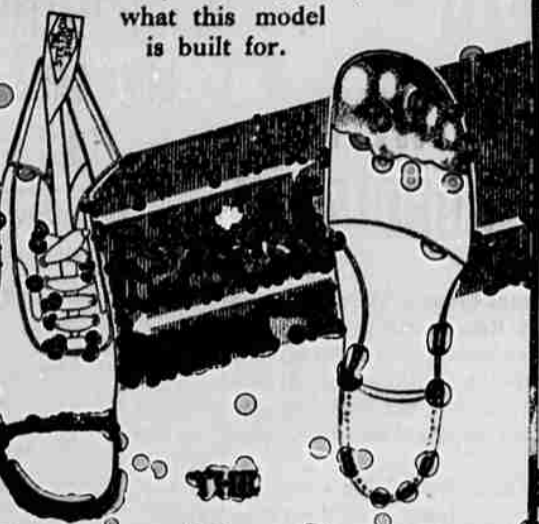

CORRESPONDENCE WORK OF 'VARSITY GROWS RAPIDLY

Over Fourteen Courses Offered To People Throughout the State

ALDERMAN GENERAL EXECUTIVE WORK

Applications So Heavy No Calculation of the Number Yet Made

Professor L. R. Alderman, head of the correspondence work, reports applications for registration in his department so heavy that account of the number has been lost.

The correspondence courses are intended especially for teachers, students preparing for college or university, women's clubs, teachers' groups, granges, and home makers.

The following correspondence courses are offered for 1908-1909: English classics, Shakespeare, pedagogy, history, Oregon history, elementary algebra, geometry—plane and solid, advanced algebra, plane trigonometry, analytic geometry, teaching of high school mathematics, algebra for teachers, mathematical reading.

These courses are prepared by members of the University faculty. On the completion of the course, including a satisfactory examination paper, a certificate of credits earned will be given the student. Credits will be allowed as follows:

English classics, 5 entrance credits or 1 unit; Shakespeare, 3 college credits; pedagogy, 3 college credits; botany, 1-2 college or 2-1-2 entrance credits; Oregon history, 3 college or 5 entrance credits; elementary algebra, 7-1-2 entrance credits or 1-1-2 units; geometry, 7-1-2 entrance credits or 1-1-2 units; advanced algebra, 1-1-2 college credits; plane trigonometry, 1-1-2 college credits; analytic geometry, 2 college credits; teaching of high school mathematics, 1 college credit.

All instruction, including examinations, is free. The student is required to make a deposit of one dollar, stamps or money order, for each course taken, to cover the cost of return postage. Those wishing to take any course as a club and having all papers sent to the address, need deposit only two dollars at first.

All books needed in these courses are bought by the student. If the local dealer does not carry the required books they can be purchased from the J. K. Gill Company, Portland, either directly or through the local dealer.

Professor Alderman travels over the state, having made a number of trips this year. He returned yesterday from Hillsboro.

The petitions for the suspension of official work during Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Thanksgiving week are being freely signed by the students. They maintain that little or no results will be obtained by study that week and that many students will not return to college in any event from the O. A. C. football game Saturday, November 21.

In case the faculty refuses to grant the petition the student body feels that a farm will have been done for the Union will tend to bring back the O. A. C. Oregon game to the local campuses of the two colleges. The feeling among the 'varsity' men has always been opposed to the idea of moving the game to Portland, and it is said that some of the faculty take the same ground.

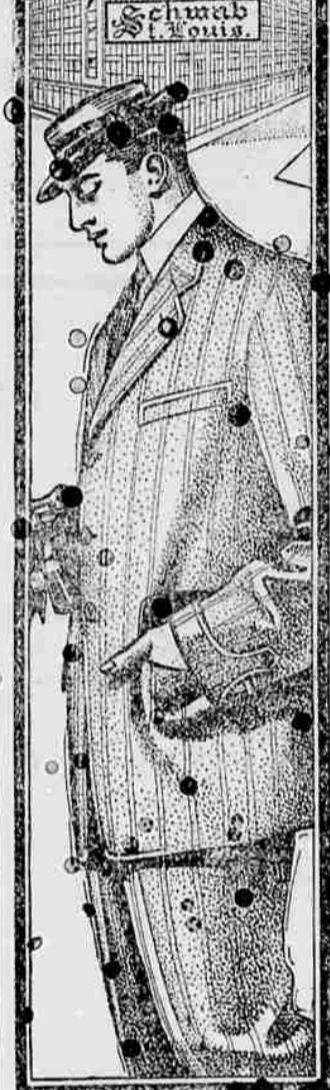
