## NEWS OF WORLD

**South Bethlehem, Pa., Oct. 20.**—The city is filled with visitors to attend the annual convention of the Women's Association of Southwestern Pennsylvania, which began a three days' session here today.

**Los Angeles, Oct. 20.**—As a result of several weeks of training Ed Weidast and Freddie Weeks appear to be in fine trim for their twenty-five round fight in the remodeled arena of the Jeffers Athletic Club.

**Decatur, Ill., Oct. 20.**—The seventh annual meeting of the Women's Baptist Foreign Missionary Society of Illinois is in session here in connection with the sixty-fourth anniversary of the Illinois Baptist state convention.

**St. Louis, Oct. 20.**—The Illinois Central railway today inaugurates its new through "Piedmont" service between St. Louis and Birmingham, making the running time between the two cities one and one-half hours.

**Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 20.**—Many visitors are in Birmingham for the fifth biennial convention to be held in the South. The sessions of which will continue during the next two days. The convention has been held in the use of the city hall for its sessions.

**Peoria, Ill., Oct. 20.**—The attitude of organized labor toward candidates for public office will be a leading subject of discussion at the annual convention of the Illinois State Federation of Labor which met at Peoria today.

**New York, Oct. 20.**—Famous old St. Andrew's church in Richmond, Staten Island, is celebrating its 200th anniversary with a program of exercises in which eminent churchmen from many parts of the country are participating. The church of St. Andrew's was founded by Queen Anne and in honor of her memory a table will be unveiled tomorrow.

**Richmond, Va., Oct. 20.**—The thirty-ninth annual meeting of the Medical Society of Virginia assembled in this city today, with headquarters at the Jefferson hotel. The program for the four days of the meeting provides for a conference of members of the various local boards of health of Virginia to discuss problems of common interest.

**Norfolk, Va., Oct. 20.**—The case of Benjamin F. Gilbert, charged with the murder of Miss Amanda Moore, was called for trial today in the corporation court. Gilbert, who had been rejected by Miss Moore, met her on night last spring on the Camptella bridge, and shot her twice. She lived only a few hours. It is believed that insanity will be the defense.

**Paris, Oct. 20.**—A merchant of Trefon has committed suicide, leaving behind him a perfect record of his life and having dominated upon his death. He bought a moving picture machine, set it running, and calmly proceeded to kill himself. Investigation showed the films to be perfect, each movement of the unhappy man being faithfully depicted. The pictures showed him looking for a chair, sitting himself upon it and loading his revolver, remaining for a while in that position, and then suddenly starting up and diving out his brains. The police have confiscated the films to prevent their exhibition.
