VERDICT FOR MORE THAN PLAINTIFF SUED

A verdict \$3767.87 greater than the plaintiff asked for in the surprising result in the case of C. O. Bryant representative-elect, et al. v. C. Whitely, against the Grand Jury. The verdict was received by Judge Morrow about midnight last night after a trial lasting three days, and now the lawyers are wondering what the result will be, says the Portland Journal.
 Bryant and Whitely sued for \$10,000 compensation on the sale of timber lands in Lane county. This is all they will be able to recover, and there appears to be some doubt as to whether or not the verdict is wholly valid. Robert Treat Platt, a woman, said he did not know what the effect of the unusual verdict would be, and R. W. Montague, who, with John M. Gearlin, represented the defendant, was also uncertain but thought the whole verdict would stand.
 The jury apparently took a different theory of the case from that presented by the case of the plaintiff. The court had pointed out this other theory during the course of the trial, and the jury evidently took a chance to that direction. The defense has secured ten days in which to move for a new trial and also to move for setting aside the verdict. It is in accordance with the findings on special issues.

ONE DEAD, TWO INJURED IN SAME COMMUNITY

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 22.—The little community of Melrose, six miles south of here, was the scene of one death and two accidents yesterday. L. S. Toothacre, an old and highly respected resident, died after a lingering illness. Mrs. Edward Henry was summoned as one of the death watch at the Toothacre home, and during the evening had occasion to descend the steps of the residence, when she slipped and fell, sustaining a broken leg and other injuries which may prove fatal.
 The same day and in the same community Mrs. Howard Ward came near meeting death by being thrown from a horse she was riding. The spirited animal ran away with her and threw her, causing internal injuries, but it is thought she will recover.

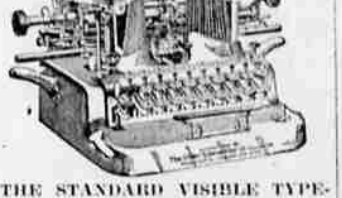
