Household goods for E. H. Watta and Fred Snyder arrived in Eugene yesterday. The latter will reside at 103 West Fourth Street.

Concrete work on the Cherry block was resumed this morning. T. E. Kille, the contractor, is using his concrete mixing machine on the job.

A car of salt for the Seattle Produce Co., and the usual quota of wood and sawlogs were included in the car loads of freight shipments into Eugene this morning.

The appraisers of the property of the estate of Henry C. Baker (C. H. Baker), have filed their report with the probate court. They appraised the property at \$5268.83.

M. A. Kees, educational director of

the Portland Y. M. C. A., will address the University students tonight in Deady Hall. In about one month he will leave for a post in China to take up Christian work.

E. Dodge, who returned last night from a trip down the valley, where he bought several car loads of potatoes, says the price is lower down that way than here on account of the crop being heavier in that section of the state.

Clifford Edwards yesterday sold the John Pennington lot and residence in the Sladden addition to Chester Hemenway of the Seattle Produce Co., and two lots in the same addition to Henry Diness.

Hons. J. D. Matlock and L. M. Travis went to Junction City on the noon train today to meet Capt. Hobson, who spoke there this afternoon, and he will speak in the courthouse in Eugene tonight. They will bring him to Eugene in an automobile.

The local W. C. T. U. has elected new officers as follows: President, Mrs. Lizzie Norris; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Libbie Palmer; recording secretary, Mrs. Jennie Hosmer; treasurer, Mrs. Josephine Hull.

The fire escape for the new I. O. O. F. block arrived here this morning and will soon be placed in position. This will be the only fire escape in the city. There should be an ordinance compelling fire escapes on all buildings three stories high and higher.

J. T. Richardson who lives several miles west of Eugene toward Crow, was in the city today. He tells that Clayton Inman, with his two fine bear dogs, has killed 14 bear

this fall. Last Thursday the dogs treed three and the day before they treed two, all of which were killed. The dogs are the best ever seen in that vicinity for hunting bear and other big game.

The old Smith & Hall warehouse is now on the north side of the railroad tracks and the S. P. Co. has again commenced filling in the low places in the depot yards in earnest. This morning 24 car loads of dirt and gravel arrived from the north for the work and more will arrive every day until the work is completed. There is a big space to fill in between the passenger depot and the freight house and it will take perhaps over a hundred car loads yet.

GOOD SCORE MADE BY COMPANY A

Members Shot on Rifle Range South of Town Yesterday

—Co. C Today

Co. C. is shooting on the rifle range south of the city today in the annual competition for the regimental and individual trophies. Co. A's team consisted of Corporal W. W. McCornack, Sergeant R. L. Perdue, Corporal E. A. Rhone and Private Perdue. Sergeant E. A. Pryor shot as a member of the company but not as a member of the team. Sergeant L. W. Baker shot as a member of the colonel's staff. Following is the score made by Co. A's men:

200 yards, slow fire—McCornack, 44; R. L. Perdue, 40; E. A. Rhone, 39; E. E. Perdue, 40—total, 163 points, or the highest yet made at this distance.

200 yards, rapid fire—McCornack, 37; R. L. Perdue, 36; Rhone, 26; E. E. Perdue, 28.

300 yards—McCornack, 41; R. L. Perdue, 43; Rhone, 32; E. E. Perdue, 39.

600 yards—McCornack, 38; R. L. Perdue, 43; Rhone, 25; E. E. Perdue, 40. Total, 591.

Scores of Other Companies. Other companies in the regiment that have shot, have made the following scores: Co. F. of McMinnville, 559 points. Co. H., Dallas, 582 points. Company G., Albany, 601 points.

Presidential registration in Douglas county, which closed last evening, totaled 281 names. Of that number about 15 are Republicans, 61 Democrats, the remaining 135 give no party affiliation. It is estimated that of the new registration about 20 names merely represent changes from one precinct to another since the last state election. Exclusive of that number, the entire registration of the county is increased to a total of 4275, of which three-fifths are Republicans.
