BRILLIANT SCENE IN YOKOHAMA HARBOR

Yokohama, Oct. 24.—On the eve of the departure of the fleet from Yokohama today the scene was the liveliest and brilliant ever seen in a city in the far East. The bay was filled with launches, darting hither and thither among the great stately warships anchored outside the breakwater, and thousands of people lined every available portion of the waterfront. Representatives of every department of the government, the diplomatic corps, and the consuls of the most prominent nations of the world were guests at a luncheon on the Commodore today. At 8 o'clock tomorrow the American fleet will head toward the Philippines, escorted by a Japanese squadron of warships.

EXPLOSION IN ROYAL PALACE

WHISKEY CRAZED PORTLAND MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Allen C. Murray Cut Both Wrists and Bled to Death

Portland, Oct. 24.—Crazed by the use of toxicants, of which he had long been a victim, and despondent because of the receipt of a letter from his brother, David S. Murray, general superintendent of the Pacific States Telephone Company, reprimanding him for his deficiencies, and because he had lost his position in Portland with the same company, Allen C. Murray early today committed suicide by cutting both wrists with a pocket knife and bleeding to death. His body was found stark naked in the terminal yards.

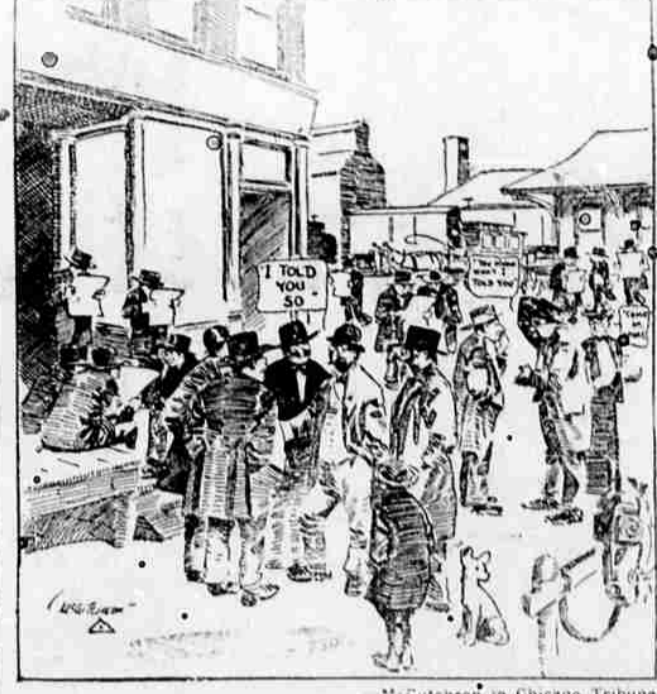
CABINET MEMBERS ORDERED TO STUMP

OREGON SCORES FIFTEEN POINTS ON WILLAMETTE

One Touchdown and Place Kick in First Half—Trouble Damp Ground

OREGON AT NO TIME WAS IN ANY DANGER

Simple Plays Used Owing to Presence of O. A. C. Men

Two touchdowns, one in each half, supplemented by a place kick by Clarke's peerless foot, in the first, was the shortest story of the Oregon-Willamette game this afternoon on Kincaid field. At no time did the Willamette team carry the ball into Oregon territory, and only three times did she make yardage. Oregon, on the other hand, tried five place kicks which failed, and was only kept from scoring more by the defensive strength of the Methodist line.

The Oregon strength was not fully shown. Simple plays only were used. O. A. C. men being present to watch the Oregon aggregation. For that reason the local team depended on plain line bucks, a few end runs and fake punts for their yardage. Clarke punting averaged about fifty yards. Oregon frequently gaining thirty to forty yards on an exchange. The Oregon line-up consisted of: Chaudier, who played a heady game at the key position being replaced by Latour-ette, who made several brilliant runs of thirty or forty yards each. Dodson went to left end, McIntyre at right half, Voight at a guard position and Hayes at halfback. Main was shifted to left tackle.

Both at quarter and Sullivan at half played the brilliant game for Willamette. The line seemed well coached, two or three of the men doing exceptional work. The stars for the Oregon team were numerous. Moulton played a good game, especially in the scrimmages. He was a good man with the ball, whenever called upon. Clarke did not make the gains with the ball that he usually does, but his kicking was good. McIntire made one brilliant run out of what was almost a fumble, a thirty-yard sprint aided by good interference, which was responsible for the score made in the second half.

FAST TEAMS IN RACE FOR VANDERBILT CUP

Motor Parkway, L. I., Oct. 24.—George Robertson in a 120-horsepower locomobile, American-made, won the fourth Vanderbilt cup race today and created a new American record for long-distance automobile racing. Herbert Lytle, driving an Italian Isotta, 50 horsepower, was a second less than two minutes behind the winner. These cars were the only ones to officially finish the race, the great crowd of not less than a quarter of a million crowding the track after the first two cars dashed across the line, and to avoid serious accidents it was necessary to stop the race. At the finish William K. Vanderbilt Jr.'s 100-horsepower German Mercedes, driven by W. C. Lutigen, was running third, with a safe lead, so he must be accorded third place.

TWO MURDERERS GET LONG TERMS IN IDAHO PRISON

Wallace, Ida., Oct. 24.—William Triplett, who shot and killed bartender John Olson at Elaville, Idaho, in August, while suffering from delirium tremens, was today sentenced to fifty years in the penitentiary. Emilio Wickshan, a Montenegro, who shot and killed an Austrian named George Southwick, under slightly extenuating circumstances, was sentenced to twenty-five years. Both were convicted of murder in the second degree.

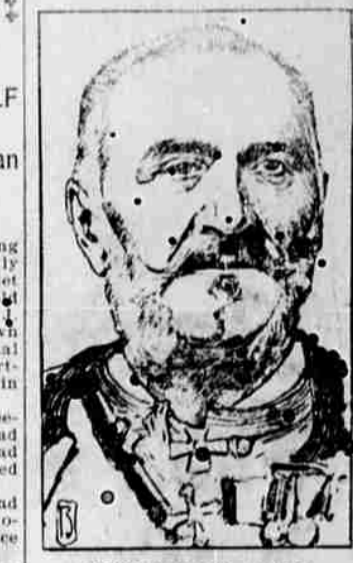

KILLED WIFE AND SHOT HIMSELF

Awful Deed of Seattle Man This Afternoon

Seattle, Oct. 24.—After shooting his wife in the brain and instantly killing her, and firing a bullet through the cheek of a year-old child, a man supposed to be A. J. Hearst turned the weapon to his head and inflicted a probably fatal wound. The tragedy occurred shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon in a vacant lot overlooking the bay. The woman was carrying a three-week-old child, and this, too, had been murdered. That is, was dead was not discovered until it arrived at the hospital. From fragments of papers found in the vicinity it is believed the woman was about to commence divorce proceedings. The woman's name was Kathleen Hearst.
